LILLEY BENT ON SUICIDE. THIRD ATTEMPT ON HIS LIFE PREVENTED BY A PRISONER.

With a five-year sentence to Stillwater for an attempt to kill his wife in the California wire house starting him in the face, Fred W. Lilley made his third attempt since the shooting of his wife to commit suicide by hanging himself in his cell Thursday night.

The attempt, however, was frustrated by Peter Anderson, a fellow prisoner, who in a moment of mercy pulled Lilley from the cell by a rope around the neck of the cell, was aroused by a peculiar noise, and looking over saw Lilley in the act of pulling himself up onto the clothes rack of the cell by a rope around the neck of the cell.

Lilley has a picture of his baby boy, and is frequently heard to make this remark: "If it wasn't for that darling boy, I would shove off."

He was taken to Stillwater yesterday afternoon, and is now serving the first day of his sentence.
