CITY NEWS.

In the distribution of state and county school funds next Wednesday, St. Paul will receive \$54,856.77, the amount accruing from the 1 mill tax. AT THE PASSION PLAY.

Rev. Dr. Sinclair Lectures on the Oberammergau Production. Rev. John Sinclair delivered a lecture on "The Passion Play" last night before a large audience at the First Presbyterian church. Dr. Sinclair presented a lecture with a short account of his trip across the ocean, and of his brief stay in London. He carried this audience with him to Oberammergau, describing the small village and the vivid word picture of the great theater, which the peasants have recently erected, explaining its seating and stage arrangements.

There was an audience of 1,000 present last night. Dr. Sinclair's lecture was what impressed him particularly about this audience was its reverent attitude. Every one who saw the play, no matter what the distance, might be amazed and awed. Even during the hour and a half allowed for luncheon there was no suggestion of levity on the part of any of the great crowd of sight-seers.

In addition to the lecture a musical programme was given last evening. It was to include a St. Paul audience singer who has recently taken up residence in this city, Miss Julia Donovan.
