

AMOS RUSIE... ONCE FAMOUS BASEBALL TWIRLER... LIVES QUIETLY AT MUNCIE, IND.

AMERICAN LEAGUE EXPIRES... Its Charter Runs Out at Midnight Tomorrow Night Unless Something is Done About It.

HARTFORD CITY, Ind., Nov. 18.—Amos Rusie, the greatest baseball pitcher of modern times, the big hero of many royal battles, now quietly though his marvelous skill in writing the sphere who has been petted and babied, loved and hugged by the big moguls of the baseball syndicate, is now living the life of a recluse practically in the town of Muncie. He is known to very few, and walks through the streets of the town unknown. He is the same Amos Rusie that has sent thrills and enthusiastic delight through the veins of thousands and thousands of people by his phenomenal pitching in the big games. Very particular about his dress, he wanders about over the city at will, seldom, if ever, accompanied by any one, apparently not caring for the public notice his presence on the streets attracts. He goes to the postoffice regularly, walks up to the general delivery window after a usually long wait, and asks in his big voice if there is any mail for Amos Rusie. The sound of his name causes those in the rear to look at him suddenly, and they keep watching him until he is out of sight. The story of Rusie's withdrawal from fandom is well known, but it is not generally known why he is leading the life of a village denizen far away from the hurly-burly existence to which he had always been accustomed. Some years ago Rusie married a woman named Maudie. She won his heart in the first inning of the game and he hers. They were married, and lived happily, the man and wife until Rusie's fortune took on a bad tinge, and, if all the stories told to be true, essayed on numerous occasions to throw his frat over the some plate in one of his famous outbursts. Mrs. Rusie would not stand for it. She applied for and secured a divorce. She then went to Muncie, where she is now residing. Amos repeated came to Indiana, met his former wife and sought a reconciliation. Finally the ex-Mrs. Rusie decided to live with him again, providing he would not play ball or visit New York. Amos promised. They were remarried, and are today living unknown to the outside world.

CHARTER OF LEAGUE EXPIRES... American Comes to an End Tomorrow at Midnight.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—Two days more and the American league will no longer be in existence. At 12 o'clock tomorrow night the five years' agreement which binds the clubs of president Johnson's organization together will expire and a new agreement will be made. President Johnson has been expending all his energies in the last few days toward the completion of the next year's plans and if the magnates can be gathered together at the last meeting of the league will be held Tuesday, otherwise an entirely new league will have to be formed, as the old charter can not be renewed.

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
FOURTH FIRE THIS YEAR... NOTRE DAME UNIVERSITY WAS BADLY SCORCHED AGAIN YESTERDAY

ART TREASURES ARE SAVED... But the South Bend Institution Was Damaged to the Extent of \$15,000.
