CONFERENCE COMMITTEE DEFEATS THE PROJECT TO ESTABLISH LIGHTING PLANT

BUDGET AT LAST COMPLETE

City Will Have to Raise by Taxation Something Over \$1,800,000 for the Fiscal Year.

Hoping to secure a nucleus of a fund for a municipal lighting plant, Charles E. Ingener, city engineer, yesterday, before the conference committee, made an earnest appeal that \$25,000 be included in the tax report to be adopted next year before the final report was adopted as it lay ready before them.

The engineer stated that in view of the liberal allowances made for projects in the budget had been passed as it stood, he deemed it proper to again broach the subject.

The plant he declared was a matter that affected the pocket of every taxpayer and as a consequence had no particular friends to urge it before the committee.

Controller McCarty said that the committee were not in financial shape to even consider the subject owing to the heavy demands already made on the budget. The proposition was voted down, Messrs. Clausen, Dix and Ames against, Corning, Wolterstorff, McCarty, Bremer, Kerwin and Chairman Smith.

The discovery has been made that the consideration of the project for the maintenance of the public baths will not operate as it was expected they would. Next year the gross expense of maintaining the public baths will reach nearly \$100,000 and if the budget had been passed as it stood the baths would have to close after the gross expense reached \$40,000. This curious condition of affairs is brought about in the following manner:

Pending the active operation of the new charter, Dr. Ohage has been allowed to run his own bank account and take the interest and income from the baths at the head of the budget. He has been set aside for baths in the budget and an allowance made for a probable revenue, the doctor will be compelled to join our organization, interviewed the city treasurer at close of business each day, and to send all bills to the council. Under this arrangement the doctor will be allowed to take the interest on the bonds for the maintenance of the baths was raised from \$5,000 to \$10,000. The \$10,000 set aside for new buildings is not affected.

PLEADED FOR AUDITORIUM.

A committee of gentlemen from the Commercial club appeared to urge that \$50,000 be provided for arranging the auditorium this winter and providing a heating plant.

The fact was mentioned that the National Buttermaker's association will be here this winter and that there is no place to accommodate the convention. The Modern Woodmen will be here in July, and the National Association of Railway conductors and several other organizations will convene in this city. Something, it was urged, ought to be done to give the city a creditable convention hall. Mr. McCarty said that the city had no money to spare for such a purpose.
