The answer of the St. Paul Depot company to the alternative view of mandamus, in the action commenced by the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railway company to compel the Union Depot company to allow the road depot and terminal facilities, was filed in the district court yesterday.

Continuing, the depot company puts the claim that at present all its grounds, tracks and facilities are occupied, and that with the Minneapolis & St. Louis road as a tenant, it would be unable to perform and do the business of its tenants in a safe or reasonably safe or efficient manner, and the usefulness of the station tracks and premises of the defendant would be greatly impaired.

INJURY TO AN ATTORNEY.

It will be remembered that the attorneys in the case made a vigorous protest before the commission at the latter's action in setting the hearing for last Monday. Their claim was that they could not prepare their cases in that length of time.

To Raise Firemen's Wages.

AMES, Ia., Dec. 4.—North-Western firemen are jubilant. The result of the hearing with the first of next month, they are to receive the highest wages of any firemen in any of the railroad companies in Iowa. The board of directors of the firemen's association will be required to keep the engines clean, the company hiring men for this purpose. Only those having regular rates and regular engines are required to keep them clean.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—The directors of the Chicago & Alton Railway company have declared a dividend of 2 per cent on the new preferred stock. James B. Moran, president of the First National Bank of Chicago, and ex-Gov. Francis M. Pickens, were elected directors of the Chicago & Alton railway today.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Dec. 4.—It is rumored that the St. Joseph & Grand Island and railroad will pass into the hands of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy soon after January 1st, the date when the Grand Island trains between St. Joseph and Kansas City will be abandoned.

RAILROAD MEN AND MATTERS.

L. E. Day has been appointed assistant superintendent of the Northern Pacific at Missoula. He has been rate clerk in the St. Paul office of the Minneapolis & St. Louis.

From January 1 to the end of the third week of November the gross earnings of the Northern Pacific amounted to \$28,150,747. This is an increase over those of the same period last year, being \$2,450,000 more.

The Burlington road reports a considerable increase in its gross earnings for the month of October. They reached the \$2,000,000 mark, which is more than the same month has shown in the history of the road. October of 1899 came the nearest, having a gross earning of \$1,913,317.
