LAST OF \$100,000 NECESSARY TO SECURE DR. PEARSON'S GIFT

IS RAISED BY THE COLLEGE

Addition to the Endowment of the Fairbank College From the Chicago Philanthropist Is \$50,000.

NORTHFIELD, Minn., Jan. 1.—There is rejoicing among the faculty, students and friends of Carleton college over the fact that the remaining \$50,000 of the \$100,000 to be raised in order to secure Dr. Pearson's gift of \$50,000 has been secured and today the college has a new endowment of \$100,000.

At commencement time one year ago D. K. Pearson, of Chicago, made the college a proposition that if it would raise the sum of \$100,000 from other sources he would give \$50,000 to the institution.

The raising of the remaining \$50,000 has been attended with more difficulty, and at the close of school for the holiday recess nearly \$20,000 of the amount had to be secured.

The John Chandler Williams fund was founded by John Chandler, one of the early settlers of Chicago, and is devoted to the endowment of the chair of mental and moral philosophy in the college.

On a Preliminary Count of Hands He Has One Less Vote Than Necessary to Put Him in the Senate.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 1.—Col. Quay was the unanimous choice of the joint caucus of Republican senators held in the chamber tonight to nominate a candidate for United States senator.

ONLY ONE VOTE SHORT. With one present and not voting and two absent on account of illness, all three of whom, it is claimed will abide by the caucus decision a vote of 125 for Quay on joint ballot is indicated.

CONCURRENT WITH THE CAUCUS. Concurrent with the caucus there was a meeting of anti-Quay Republicans. At the meeting the text of the resolution to oppose the selection was made public.
