CUSHMAN, OF WASHINGTON, SHOWS UP THE RIVER AND HARBOR BILL

NO DISTRICT HAS ANY SHOW UNLESS IT HAS A MEMBER ON THE RIVER AND HARBOR COMMITTEE

FACTS AND FIGURES GIVEN

Seventeen States With Committee Representation Get Five-Sixths of the Total Proposed Appropriation.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The desk of Representative Clark, of New Hampshire, who died last night at his home, was shrouded in black and covered with flowers when the house met today.

By unanimous consent the bill to revise and codify the postal laws of the United States was made a special order after the disposal of the river and harbor bill.

The following dates were set aside for paying tribute: Saturday, Feb. 2, at 3 o'clock, to the late Senator C. K. Davis, of Minnesota.

Mr. Grosvenor (D.) replied briefly to the remarks of some of the Western members in favor of appropriations in the river and harbor bill for the re-claiming of arid lands.

Mr. Hepburn (D.) then took the floor for an hour's speech, in which he vigorously assailed various features of the bill.

Mr. Hepburn and Mr. W. A. Smith (Mich.) had a sharp exchange in which personalities were bandied back and forth.

Mr. Hepburn also assailed the policy of the river and harbor committee in reopening the harbor to the traffic of some ship which some freak ship-builder saw fit to build.

Mr. Cushman said he was in favor of river and harbor improvements. But a bill for that purpose should be for the benefit of the whole country and not for the benefit of the members of the committee.

SEATTLE NOT IN IT

He spoke, he said, as one who had been victimized by the bill. He said the committee had "overlooked" his state as if it had been a foreign country.

Mr. Cushman's criticisms around the members of the committee and the bill were a continual fire of questions while he was speaking.

FOR A NON-EXISTENT HARBOR.

Another time, Mr. Cushman declared, the Florida member of the committee had secured an appropriation in the bill for a harbor that could not be found in the latest and largest maps.

IS A WASHINGTON PLAN.

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
