UNCLE SAM ACTS PROMPTLY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—At the request of the state department, the navy department has instructed the commander of the Scorpion to proceed at once from La Guayra to Guanaco, Venezuela, to protect American interests upon reports that the revolutionary movement there is increasing and the attempt is being made to take possession of the arms of the New York and Bermudez company.

WEST POINT CADETS SCORED FOR HAZING

CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATORS TELL THEIR OPINIONS IN VERY PLAIN LANGUAGE.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Jan. 16.—The congressional committee put in a good day's work at the West Point academy. While they relaxed for a few hours in the afternoon to witness a drill of the first-class cadets in the riding school, they got down to the bottom of the hazing problem at the academy during the last four years, and while at least a dozen other witnesses have yet to be examined in this connection, the committee has laid out the work for finishing the inquiry before the end of the week.

BOSSCHIETER CASE NEARING ITS END

TESTIMONY IS ALL IN, DEFENSE HAVING ENTERED A GENERAL DENIAL.

PATERSON, N. J., Jan. 16.—Counsel for the defense in the Jennie Bosschietter murder trial today practically closed their case. William A. Deeth, Walter L. McAister and Andrew Campbell, the three men on trial for the murder, went on the stand in their own behalf and told their versions of the events of the night Jennie Bosschietter died, while in their company. They told the same story practically, and their testimony varied but little as to details. The state set up by counsel for the prosecution a general and specific denial of all the accusations made against the men. He opened with an attack on the moral character of the girl, and claimed that the prisoners were in no way responsible for the death of Jennie Bosschietter. He claimed that she had not been drugged, and he denied that she had been ill-treated and assaulted.

DE WET IS PREPARING TO ATTACK JOHANNESBURG

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The important report received from Johannesburg, that Gen Dewet has crossed the Vaal and joined forces with the Transvaal commandos, if true, probably means the concentration of 7,000 Boers, with several guns, for another big attack. There is a rumor current in Cape Town that several Boer leaders are urging an attack upon the mines. It has been long understood that Gen. Dewet has been anxious to join the invaders in Cape Colony, and this rumor may be spread to cover an attempt to break southward. As an outcome of the fact that the Boers in several instances have worn khaki, a government notice has been promulgated in Pretoria prohibiting civilians from wearing khaki, and notifying all persons who wear this costume, which is likely to be mistaken for the British uniform, that they will render themselves liable to arrest and imprisonment. The war office issued no fresh news yesterday. The general is said to be very brisk in both London and the provinces. Defensive measures in South Africa proceed apace. Seven thousand men have joined the city guard in Cape Town, and 3,000 others have volunteered in the suburbs.

WITH HIS THROAT CUT FROM EAR TO EAR

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—The body of a man, with his throat cut from ear to ear, and showing marks of violence, was found in a trunk on a pile of skulls at the bulkhead of Pier 11, East river, just before noon today. It was identified two hours later by a woman as the body of Michael Weisberger, an East side Hebrew, who was employed by a jewelry firm to sell jewelry on the installment plan. The name of the woman who identified the victim and the address at which he lived were given to the police by Capt. Titus, head of the detective bureau, refused to disclose. Capt. Titus declared that the motive for the crime was robbery, and intimated that at least two men were concerned in the murder.

DEADLOCK IN NEBRASKA

PROSPECT OF ELECTION AS FAR AWAY AS EVER. LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 16.—Another effort to solve the Nebraska senatorial puzzle was begun by Republican leaders this evening, when an entirely new petition for a caucus was circulated. It provides that sixty-seven of the seventy-two Republican legislators shall be necessary for a caucus and that forty-eight can nominate. Many signatures were secured tonight and the effort will be continued tomorrow. Today's balloting in joint ballot is believed to have disclosed nearly the full strength of the leading candidates.
