COLONIALISM WILL DESTROY THE NATION

Violation of Pledges to Cubans and Filipinos Denounced in Strong Terms by the Buckeye Congressman.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The consideration of the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill in the house today developed something of a sensation when Representative Brown, of Ohio, a Republican, standing in the center of the Republican side of the chamber, made a speech strongly condemning a colonial policy and urging that congress should at once give assurance to the Filipinos that the purpose of the United States was to give them independence.

Consideration of the diplomatic and consular bill went over at 2 o'clock, and the rest of the day was given to eulogies to the late Representative Daly, of New Jersey, and Wise, of Virginia.

Mr. Brown, addressing the house, urged that congress should give definite assurance to the Filipinos that the purpose of the United States in retaining the Philippines was to give them independence.

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

FOLLOWED BY CROWDS

MRS. NATION MAKES THE ROUNDS OF THE DES MOINES JOINTS. MUCH LIKE WILLIAM J. BRYAN. CURIOSITY SEEKERS CROWDED TO THE RAILWAY STATIONS TO SEE THE SMASHER. NO DAMAGE DONE YESTERDAY. Wrecker From Kansas Is Offered \$500 Per Month to Advertise One of the Brewing Companies.

DES MOINES, Io., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Nation, during her tour through the southern part of the state this morning, made addresses from the front of a Rock Island passenger train to as many crowds in the towns she passed through as she could find. In the afternoon she visited four Des Moines precincts, where she was surrounded by a big crowd on the street that the police were compelled to stop the train, and as Mrs. Nation saw them coming down the aisle she cried out joyfully: "Hello, boys, glad to see you, shake hands; God bless the boys and the young men; I tell you I just love you all."

JUST LIKE CIRCUS DAY. At Des Moines there were fully 5,000 people at the depot when the train pulled in. After half an hour's work on the part of the police, a way was made for Mrs. Nation to reach the car which she reached in a carriage which had been provided. Once inside the carriage the clamor for a shake of her hand was too great and the crusader stopped out of the carriage, and clinging to the swinging door with one hand, frantically grasped the other, crying all the time, "God bless you."

VISITED THE SALOONS. This she agreed to do at 3:30 accompanied by two city detectives detailed by the chief of police, called upon four saloon keepers in their places of business, which is the usual way in an emergency crowd. When the bar-room of the Kluckwood was reached, the chief of police held a hasty consultation with his assistants and the crusader stepped out of the carriage, which was accompanied without objection on the part of Mrs. Nation.

OFFER FROM A BREWERY. During the afternoon Mrs. Nation received a telegram from a well-known brewing company, offering her \$30 a month to go on the road and advertise their beer, she replied: "If it is your pleasure that I shall advertize your business with the hatchery, which is my usual way, I am at your service. I promise that every one shall hear of your famous beer."

RESULTS IN TOPEKA. Vigorous Legal Campaign Inaugurated Against the Joints. TOPEKA, Kas., Feb. 9.—Attorney General Goddard tonight appointed Judge A. L. TROOPS ON THE MOVE

VON WALTERS KEEPS HIS MEN AT PEBKIN HUSBY. BERLIN, Feb. 9.—A dispatch from Field Marshal Count von Waldersce, dated Pekin, Friday, Feb. 8, says: "Cleve's column is returning. It has arrived at Sing Ho, ten kilometers north of Pekin. A jagger company, detachments of cavalry, mounted infantry and artillery have gone to Nan Kow, 60 kilometers from Pekin, to investigate fresh raiders of Christians, recently reported."
