RETURN FROM PRESBYTERIES

SHOW SUCH THE DESIRE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The committee of prominent members of the Presbyterian church appointed to consider the question of a revision of the creed reported to the next general assembly to be held in May, resumed its session tonight, after an adjournment of some weeks.

At the close of the last meeting of the committee a statement was issued to the general effect that the returns from the Presbyteries plainly indicated that the church desired some changes in its creed.

It is expected that some abeyance for further consideration and definite action in the direction of a revision of the confession and of a supplementary statement will be agreed on at this meeting.

At tonight's meeting only preliminary business was transacted. Reports from seven additional presbyteries containing their views on the questions proposed were submitted.

ARMY APPROPRIATION BILL Passed After a Discussion Devoted Mainly to the Charge of Desertion Against Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The house today passed the army appropriation bill and entered upon consideration of the sundry civil bill, the last but one of the big money bills.

The debate on the army bill was confined largely to a discussion of the question of passing bills to remove the charge of desertion against soldiers and was made notable by a statement by Mr. McMillan (N. Y.), comparing the cost of the soldier in European armies with the cost in the United States.

According to his figures, including the cost of pensions, etc., each United States soldier cost \$228 a year, while a German soldier cost \$27, and a French soldier \$22.

At the opening of the house the chaplain of the house, his invocation today referred to the fact that this was the anniversary of the birth of Lincoln, the emancipator, and prayed that his life might be an example and inspiration to those now living.

At the instigation of Mr. Sulzer (N. Y.) during the exciting session of yesterday, was resumed. The letter appeared in the Record this morning.

SULZER AND HEATH. Mr. Knox (Mass.) called up the alleged infringement of the privileges of the house. He claimed that the matter was before the house in two ways.

First, as unauthorized charges, as a matter appearing in the Record over which the house had control. Mr. Knox said he admitted that a member might, upon his own responsibility, charge another with an offense against a member of the house and not be liable to be called to order.

He contended that when a member introduced a paper the house obtained jurisdiction. He asked the house to adopt a resolution which he sent to the clerk's desk. The resolution recited the occurrence of yesterday and directed that the document be stricken from the Record.

Mr. Bailey (Tex.) asked Mr. Knox to withdraw the preamble of the resolution, "I myself," which he refused to do.

Mr. Knox consented to strike out the preamble and was about to demand the previous question, but at the request of Mr. Sulzer, yielded five minutes to the New York member.

SULZER STRIKES AGAIN. Mr. Sulzer said he was at a loss to understand the next objection to the character of Perry S. Heath, who was not a member of the house, while his party associates were existing delightfully in the attempt to strip the name of Sulzer and reputation. "I stand here," he continued, "and say that no man in this house can be so stupid as to believe that whatever or with any misconduct. Mr. Tawney (Minn.), chairman of the committee on the special committee on the St. Louis exposure, was tried to get up the exposition bill, but Mr. Cannon, chairman of the appropriations committee, declined to allow it to come up until the pending appropriation bills were disposed of the way, and accordingly the house went into committee of the whole and took up the consideration of the military affairs committee, made a brief explanation. The bill carries \$17,594,648, \$15,355,125 less than the estimates.

GROWTH OF BILLS. Mr. Slayden (Tex.), a member of the committee, devoted thirty minutes to discussing the enormous growth in recent years of bills to remove the charge of desertion against soldiers of the Regular Army. During the present Congress 2,241 private bills referred to the military committee, 2,669 of which were the charge of desertion.

Mr. William Alden Smith (Mich.) defended the bill against the sweeping charges made by Mr. Slayden. Mr. Boutell (Ill.) and Mr. Clayton (Ala.) also contended that there were many meritorious cases of desertion for the removal of the charge of desertion. Each cited cases.

Mr. McMillan (N. Y.) made an interesting statement as to the total cost, he said, was \$12,786,769. To this must be added, he said, \$154,622,094 for the cost of past wars, pensions, etc., bringing the total up to \$232,515,864. The cost of each soldier, not counting pensions, etc., therefore, would be \$1,288, including pensions, \$2,828.

The cost of the German service including pensions and expenses of past wars, he said, was only \$27, and of the French soldiers also including pensions and the expense of the Franco-Prussian war, \$32.

TO CHANGE THE CREED

CROWD ENTHUSED OVER HIM

A DEMONSTRATION SUGGESTIVE OF THOSE OF LAST FALL WAS WITNESSED

WARM PRAISE FOR JEFFERSON

Was Born Among the Aristocracy, but Was the Champion of the Common People—Other Speakers.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 12.—The ninety-second anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln was celebrated here tonight by the Jefferson, Jackson and Lincoln league, with a dollar dinner at the Columbus auditorium. There were fully fifteen hundred people seated at the tables which occupied the floor of the immense hall and 1,000 more were seated in the galleries which had been thrown open to spectators.

Many ladies were noticed among those at the tables. The bill of fare was not elaborate. There were no cigars and no beverages stronger than coffee. It was 7 o'clock before the banquet began, and considerably after 8 before the speaking started.

The feature of the evening was the demonstration in honor of Mr. Bryan. He was received with loud applause when he entered the hall, but the crowd fairly went wild when Mr. Bryan was introduced to speak. Men climbed upon chairs and cheered again and again, and it was some minutes before the demonstration subsided.

Congressman John J. Lentz, as toastmaster, introduced Mr. Bryan, "the last time," said Mr. Lentz, "I had the pleasure of introducing Mr. Bryan to you, I introduced him as the next president of the United States. I again introduce him to you as I did then. Following is an abstract of Mr. Bryan's speech:
