SLAUGHTERED FOR HIDES SAM FULLERTON DISCOVERS MANY DEER HIDES IN A TANNERY. While in the vicinity of Grand Rapids recently, Executive Agent S. F. Fullerton unearthed a plant that is now thought to be largely responsible for the wholesale killing of moose and deer that has threatened for some time to devastate that part of the state of these law-prosecuted animals. The plant, which was located on the shore of Grove lake, thirty miles from Grand Rapids, was only an ordinary-looking tannery, but an investigation of the premises brought to light 127 deer and fourteen moose hides undergoing conversion into leather. On complaint of Fullerton, the proprietor, Bell Linden, was arrested for having a deer hide in his possession and fined \$100.

sands of deer and moose have been slaughtered for their hides. WHO IS TO PAY JANITOR CLEANING OF TEMPORARY JAIL A BONE OF CONTENTION. When the top floor of the city hall was given over to the county commissioners for county jail purposes, it was provided that the cleaning of the same should devolve upon the custodian of the building, its officers in this respect through its occupancy by the county to be his particular charge. At the meeting of the board of county commissioners yesterday, a bill for \$21 for labor employed in cleaning the top floor preparatory to its use as a jail was handed in, but the members refused to allow it referring the matter to the county commissioners as coming under their jurisdiction.

The extra added to the population and equipment of the building will necessitate the employment of three additional janitors, and their pay promises to be a bone of contention between the two commissions. A compromise will probably be effected by placing them under the jurisdiction of the joint commission, and having the county and city each pay one-half towards their compensation. In

the old jail the work was done by the jailors and the county paid the bill. The commission received and took under consideration an application from Registrar of Deeds Fitzgerald for more desks, and one from County Treasurer Metzger, in which he asked that a private office be provided and that the space outside the counter be widened.
