THREE DEAD IN A NEWSPAPER FIRE

Fatal blaze in Boston Daily Advertiser Building—Victims, Unable to Make Their Escape, Were Suffocated.

Flames Started in the Basement and Raged Up the Elevator Shaft—Editors Ran for Their Lives.

BOSTON, March 15.—Three lives sacrificed, nearly a dozen more or less injured and many thousands of dollars damage is the result of a fire in the Daily Advertiser and Record seven-story granite front building in Newspaper Row tonight.

The dead are: JAMES RICHARDSON SR., proofreader, of Cambridge. WALTER LUSCOMBE, proofreader, of Cambridge. JUDSON CRAMP, proofreader, of Cambridge. How the fire started is not known, but it was first seen in the press room, and it spread to the elevator well and darted to the top so rapidly that before the occupants of the two upper floors were aware the building was on fire. Their rooms were filled with flames and smoke.

Bloodshed has occurred and the students threaten barricades and street fighting. It is not safe for individuals to leave their homes in the day time. The schools are closed and the city is virtually in a state of siege."

BONI AND DE RODAYS.

COUNT AND EDITOR SHOOT AT EACH OTHER THIS MORNING. PARIS, March 15.—The seconds of Count Boni de Castellane and M. de Rodays met today and decided that the duel is to take place tomorrow morning. Two shots will be exchanged at twenty-five paces. M. Perrier, one of M. de Rodays' seconds, who is ex-manager of the Figaro, in an interview today, declared that the duel would be absolutely private.
