REV. DR. J. S. MONTGOMERY ADDRESSES GRADUATES OF STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

PLEA FOR HIGHER IDEALS

Students Exhorted to Make the Most of Their Opportunities and to Lead Lives of Usefulness.

The graduating class at the state agricultural school yesterday afternoon listened to the baccalaureate sermon by Rev. James S. Montgomery, of the Wesley M. E. church, Minneapolis.

Who Delivered the Baccalaureate Sermon to the Graduating Class of the State Agricultural College Yesterday Afternoon.

Principal Frederick D. Tucker is highly pleased with the work of the present class, and says that at least 80 per cent of the members will go back to their home farms when the graduating exercises are over, something which, he thinks, cannot be said of similar classes in other states.

Both the young men and women have just finished a three years' course in agriculture, horticulture, stock raising and dairying. The course for the young women has included special training in cooking and sewing, and that for the young men special training in blacksmithing, engineering and carpentering.

Dr. Montgomery's sermon was a masterly effort, and was closely followed by the large audience. It appealed, of course, with special force to the members of the graduating class, who seemed to be deeply impressed by the forceful, eloquent words of the speaker, and by the feeling manner in which it was delivered.
