

RUSSIAN AUTHORITIES LOOK FOR FURTHER SERIOUS OUTBREAKS AT ST. PETERSBURG

THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN

Reported That Three Students and at Least One Cossack Were Killed in the Battle of Sunday.

ST. PETERSBURG, Monday, March 19.—Alarm pervades high circles here. The police have notified house owners to report for duty and show themselves in constant readiness.

It is reported one official of the political police said 1,500 prisoners were taken, among them being 350 women students.

After reading the manifesto the students threw their hats and coats, and a crowd and raised a flag inscribed: "For Liberty." The students also shouted, "Help us get our rights," and the mob responded with "Long live the Czar!"

OFFICIAL ACCOUNT. The Official Messenger, which prints an account of the disorders in various Russian cities and in St. Petersburg Sunday, says of the latter:

"When the crowd, which numbered 3,000, became turbulent, the Cossacks and police were summoned. The demonstrators retreated to the Cathedral of Our Lady of Kazan, pulling the Cossacks and police with varied missiles.

TESTIMONY AT INQUEST ON VICTIMS OF DOREMUS LAUNDRY BOILER EXPLOSION

Engineer Had to Constantly Repair Leaks in the Boiler—Dammaging Testimony by Former Employee.

CHICAGO, March 19.—At the inquest over the victims of the Doremus laundry explosion of March 12, considerable testimony was given yesterday.

KNOWN TO BE UNSAFE. The steam engine of the boiler was set to blow off at ninety pounds pressure, and was constantly carried between 90 and 100 pounds. It was a common occurrence to have the boiler blown off.

HAS BEEN THE DESTRUCTION OF A VAST AND GROWING TRADE WITH CHINA

THE UNITED STATES HARD HIT

Exports to China, Which, Early in 1900, Were the Largest on Record, Now Show a Serious Falling Off.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—The state department has received from the United States Consul at Chefoo, and Ragdale at Tien Tsin, reports intended for duty and show themselves in constant readiness.

At Chefoo, which, compared with the interior of the country, is peaceful, there were more riots and tumults than ever were known before and the various American mission losses probably will total \$50,000.

At Tien Tsin, the trade was fighting out almost completely. The only foreign goods that entered there, it is stated, was Russia, that government setting the port as early as Aug. 4.

ON "CHINESE CIVILIZATION"

Eloquent and Scholarly Oriental Delivers Striking Address Comparing History and Present Condition of China.

CHICAGO, March 19.—Wu Ting Fung, Chinese minister to the United States, delivered the convocation address of the University of Chicago, at the Studenbaker theater, this afternoon, before that packed the institution and an audience that packed the theater to the doors.

His defense of the civilization of his native country in his address, which was most applauded, in beginning his address Mr. Wu said China had been to other nations like the Chinese community in the heart of a mountain as told by Chinese writer of 1,500 years ago.

MINISTER WU'S ADDRESS. "To her isolation she undoubtedly owes her long freedom from foreign domination.
