

PLANNING A NEW HOSPITAL

PRESENTATION SISTERS OF ABERDEEN, S. D., TO ERRECT A NEW STRUCTURE

PLANS HAVE BEEN DRAWN

Call for the Most Perfect Institution of the Kind to Be Found in South Dakota—Question of Funds.

Special Correspondence of the Globe. ALBERT DEEN, S. D., March 23.—Mother Joseph has just received the completed plans and specifications for the new St. Luke's hospital building which the Presentation Sisters will build in this city, and they show that it will be the most complete and perfectly equipped institution of the kind in the state.

The whole building will be equipped with approved ventilating shafts, every floor being connected in such manner as to secure the best of ventilation and plenty of the purest air. An elevator capable of carrying a load of 1,000 pounds or more will run from the basement to the top floor, and a large double water wheel convey meals or other necessities for the patients from the kitchen to every floor.

Besides the rooms and equipments mentioned, each floor has a drug room, serving room, bath room, closets, lavatories, etc., and each chamber has a closet of its own, while the corridors have closets for linen, etc. Not an inch of space is wasted in the building in any place, and it is believed that for the ground space to be covered the hospital will be the most perfect in its appointments to be found anywhere.

The question of funds for the construction of the hospital is one not entirely settled, and Mother Joseph has been completing the building she will have to depend much upon the generosity of the people of Aberdeen and of friends elsewhere.
