G. A. B. VETERAN DEAD. Selig Philipson Succumbs to Paralytic Stroke—Had a War Record.

Selig Philipson, one of the most familiar figures in local G. A. R. circles for the past thirty years, is dead as a result of a paralytic stroke after an illness of several months.

All the old soldiers in the city will be shocked to learn the news that several prominent auxiliary associations will be represented at the funeral, which will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the residence on Fourth street, between Hoffman and Commercial.

Philipson was a private of Company B, of the Twenty-ninth New Jersey volunteers, and also served in the same regiment. He came to St. Paul in 1883, and had lived here ever since. Until two years ago he kept a confectionery store on the corner of Commercial and Third.

He was always active in G. A. R. circles, and was beloved by all the comrades who knew him. The dead soldier had a record to be proud of. He fought in many battles of the war, and at the battle of Gettysburg was given a gold medal for distinguished service.

Victim of Yesterday's Gun Play Was Frank Hansen. Joseph Witky, whose gun play in a quarrel on the upper flats Sunday afternoon led to the wounding of Frank Hansen and the arrest of himself, appeared in the police court yesterday morning, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. The case was continued until today.

The right of the State Investment company to participate with the depositors in the proceeds of the bank is based on a claim of the State of Minnesota, which the stock was established and issued, is invalid, because it is in conflict with certain provisions of the constitution, and because it is "so anomalous as to be incapable of being complied with."

It is sufficient if the title fairly and reasonably expresses the subject or is sufficiently broad or comprehensive to embrace the several provisions relating to the corporation in the law.

It is well settled by the decisions of the supreme court of this state that the grant of additional powers or franchises to a corporation already in existence does not come within the inhibition of this provision.

The claim that the act is so anomalous as to be incapable of being complied with is without foundation. It is true that the holders of the stock provided for were not endowed with the usual privilege and powers of stockholders in corporations, but that is not an objection to the validity of the law.

Any person who took the stock took it subject to the provisions of the law under which it was issued.
