
REV. DR. FAUDE IS DEAD

PROMINENT EPISCOPAL DIVINE OF MINNEAPOLIS SUCCEEDS TO APPENDICITIS. HE WAS ILL ONLY TEN DAYS. Typhoid Fever and Appendicitis Terminated an Ecclesiastical Career Brilliant From Its Start.

Typhoid fever followed by an attack of appendicitis which necessitated a dangerous operation, yesterday, caused the death of Rev. John Jacob Faude, rector of Gethsemane Episcopal church, Minneapolis. The deceased had been in the ecclesiastical career of twenty-five years' duration, from the start gave promise of the brilliant parochial and organization talents with which he was endowed. Since he became a priest he served in three cities; six years at Plymouth, Ind.; eight years at Michigan City, Ind., and eleven years at Minneapolis.

Until ten days ago he was in excellent health, and conducted a service at his church as late as a week ago last Saturday. He was, however, feeling ill at the time and immediately went to bed, and stayed there until death terminated his sufferings.

The funeral services, at the request of Dr. Faude before he died, will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Webster, tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Webster, will be assisted by several clergymen. Three celebrations of the Holy communion will be arranged during the morning. The pallbearers will be clergymen.

A committee consisting of the junior and senior wardens of the church, C. G. Church and E. P. Weitzel, together with the curate, Rev. Mr. Webster, and Rev. F. T. Welch of St. Paul's church, and George W. Osborne, of this city, an old friend and college friend of Dr. Faude, have been appointed to meet and make any further arrangements for the funeral which may be necessary.

Mr. Faude leaves a wife and four children. Fred M. Faude, employed in the civil engineering department of the Northern Pacific railway in the city; Frank C. Faude, northwestern editor of the Minneapolis Times; Paul Faude, engaged with the Northern Pacific at Spokane, Wash., but about to enter school to study for the ministry; Alice E. Faude, who has been attending school at St. Mary's, Fairbault. Miss Faude arrived Sunday evening. Paul Faude was telegraphed on Saturday, and is on the way home. The other members of the family are in Minneapolis.

REV. DR. FAUDE'S CAREER. John Jacob Faude was born August 23, 1852, at Tuttingen, Wurtemberg. At the age of six months he was taken to his country with his parents and settled in Clearwater, Mich., and attended the public schools there. Later he entered the grammar department of Racine college, during the incumbency of the famous Dr. T. W. Maclean, president. Rev. T. W. Maclean of Minneapolis, and Frank O. Osborn, were schoolmates of Dr. Faude, and remember him well as a young boy. He entered the choir and had the sweetest treble voice in the school. He took part of the college course at Racine, and finished about the year 1872. The young collegian was afterwards engaged in a book store at St. Wayne, Ind., for a year or more, and then entered the Nashville Divinity school; from this institution he received his degree. Mr. Faude's work as a layman will entertain the members of the church in Plymouth, Ind. In 1882 he entered his pastorate of Trinity church in Michigan City, Ind. He was installed rector of this church, and in 1885, he was elected missionary bishop of the Platte.

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BLOW TO STOCKHOLDERS

OWNERS OF ALLEMANIA BANK STOCK TO BE ASSESSED 100 PER CENT

LITIGATION WILL FOLLOW

Excluded Ones Will Set Up Defense That They Were Assessed on the Reorganization Scheme.

Stockholders in the Allemania bank, twice closed under orders from the state examiner, will have to suffer an assessment against their holdings. The order to this effect was yesterday issued to Receiver Hunt by Judge Otis and will be carried into effect by that official, unless the courts are appealed to.

The matter came up yesterday before Judge Otis on petition by the receiver for an assessment, and the argument indulged in by the attorneys representing the several interests were mainly on how large the assessment should be. The present assets of the bank are placed at \$17,500, while the liabilities amount to \$7,000, of which \$5,000 in claims have been disallowed. This practically makes an indebtedness of \$4,500, which, with the expenses of the receivership, would bring the liability of the defunct corporation up to a figure that not less than an assessment of 100 per cent would wipe out. Judge Otis accordingly instructed that the assessment be made.

Attorney Trask, acting for the receiver, informed the court that he had inquired into the responsibility of the 250 or more stockholders of the bank and had found a rather mixed state of affairs. The holders of \$6,000 of the stock were entirely solvent and had no defense against the liability of the bank. The \$12,500 were probably solvent, with the only defense that they had paid one assessment. The holders of \$2,500 were solvent with no defense, except an assignment of their stock, and the remainder, representing about \$2,500 of the stock, not solvent. There were others.

TAX SALE NULLIFIED

County Treasurer Loses More Money on 1896 Transaction.

Ex-County Auditor Sullivan's failure to observe the law relative to the sale of property for the non-payment of taxes, received another airing yesterday, and caused a further depletion of the county treasury, when Judge Lewis handed down an order declaring null and void the tax sale of 1896, which deprived Oscar Holman of his property.

The order of the court in levying the assessment does not prevent any stockholder from making his defense, and as a result the assessment will in all probability be attacked. A defense advanced by some will be that they paid from \$9 to \$25 per cent on the reorganization scheme.

Of this amount Receiver Hunt thinks only \$50,000 will be reached by the assessment, in which case another assessment will be necessary. Since the insolvency of the bank many of the stockholders have turned over their holdings to responsible parties, and these transfers will in all probability be attacked in the courts.

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CONVICTED OF CONTEMPT

Bankrupt Tobaccoists Fail to Answer District Court Summons.

Fernandez Durker and Miguel Marine, proprietors of the Marine Tobacco company, were adjudged to be in contempt of court by Judge Lewis yesterday for failing to appear and testify in a disclosure proceeding now seeking relief in the bankruptcy courts, and for this reason the court refused to acknowledge the authority of the lower courts. The case may be purged of contempt, Judge Lewis has given them the alternative of paying \$75, or being committed to jail for a period of ten days.

Sentenced for Theft.

William Bernisford, indicted by the late grand jury on a charge of stealing five boxes of harness nails from the warehouse of Nicholas Desnoy, yesterday came voluntarily into court and entered a plea of guilty. He claimed to be drunk at the time the theft was committed and could not really say whether he took the nails or not. He was given one year in the state prison.

COURT NOTES.

Petition was yesterday made in the probate court for the appointment of the will of Maria L. Luckert, lately deceased. The estate is valued at \$6,700, of which Nicholas Desnoy, who is her only direct heir, is named as executor.

John T. Davis, was adjudged insane in the probate court yesterday, and ordered taken to the asylum at Rochester, N. Y., where he is confined in the asylum.

In an order made yesterday, Judge Lewis directs a stay of twenty days in the case of Ella Cunningham against William Cunningham, a divorce suit in which a decision for the plaintiff was given some days since.

In the habeas corpus proceedings brought by Nels J. Thomasberg, a minister in Minneapolis, who seeks to recover his children, claiming that they are being secreted by Mrs. Annie Christensen, the latter yesterday made answer, denying the charge. She says that the children are in charge of her daughter, who is Thomasberg's wife. The daughter is simply making her home with her.

Judgment for \$6.48 has been given the Juliet Murray Lang cure institute against George Schramm. The daughter is heard in Justice Baker's court. The suit was for treatment given.

"REMEMBER COPENHAGEN"

Anniversary of Nelson's Famous Victory Observed. COPENHAGEN, April 2.—The 100th anniversary of the naval battle which was fought at Copenhagen, 1801, between the English and the Danes, was celebrated here today. The city was generally draped in flags and there was a naval and military parade.

The graves of the Englishmen and Danes who fell in the engagement a century ago were decorated, and an impressive service was held in Holmen's cemetery, at which the entire Danish royal family was present.

Norway, which in 1801 was an ally of Denmark, sent an armed ship to participate in the celebration, and curiously enough this warship was built in England. The Norwegian naval officers were received by the king of Denmark today, and have been invited to attend a banquet to be given at the Navy club to-night.

Copenhagen was bombarded by the English under Admiral Nelson and Parker April 2, 1801, the Danish fleet also taking part in the engagement. Out of twenty-eight ships of the line, eighteen were captured or destroyed by the English. This event led to the formation of the so-called armed neutrality, or confederation against England, formed by Russia, Sweden and Denmark.
