MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE

PRESERVES ITS DIGNITY INVESTIGATION IS OPEN

SENATE PROCEEDS WITH TRANSPARENT MANNER CONSOLIDATION OF RANGE RAILROADS WILL NOT BE LOOKED INTO

MANY BILLS DISPOSED OF MILLER RESOLUTION BEATEN

Beet Sugar Bounty Bill Sent to the Governor Along With Considerable Other Legislation.

In orderly manner and with no manifestation of undignified haste the senate spent the day yesterday in disposing of a large list of bills. There was nothing specially exciting in the proceedings. Senator Young suggested a clever little move which carried. It was to allow each senator upon roll call to call up a bill from general orders and to have the bill taken up and passed in the same order as the roll call and its passage. There was a warm debate over the Hillary log lien bill, with Senators Erickman and Hopes supporting the measure and Senators McCarthy and Baldwin opposing it. The bill was finally amended by Senator Baldwin to take effect on Sept. 1. The lumbermen, he stated, are just now receiving their wages and the law, if it should take effect at once, would work hardship upon them.

The Sikorski bill to legalize the catching of fish in the Mississippi river below St. Anthony Falls was killed. There were fifteen affirmative votes and twenty-nine recorded against the measure, and this after Mr. Sikorski had been allowed the privilege of the floor and made a special plea for the passage of his bill. The bill was amended by Senator Barker and passed after long debate. The Potter medical bill met long delay in the morning, as did the Mallory bill regarding fraternal beneficiary societies, and the Allyn bill authorizing the state superintendent to revoke teachers' certificates in certain cases. The Potter bill was tarry argued, Senator Jenson assailing it with more than his usual vigor. The Mallory bill was also given considerable attention.

A futile attempt to revive the sugar bounty bill showed for that measure just two more friends in the senate. By the passage of the Roberts bill drawing a salary of \$1,200 per year. The winter baking powder bill, compelling manufacturers to list in English the formula of their product, was passed, amended to take effect Aug. 1.
