CONFIRMED BY WAR OFFICE

NEW PLAN APPLIES ONLY TO REFRIGERATED BEEF FOR THE ARMY

WHAT WILSON HAS TO SAY

Consensus of Opinion is That the Annotion, Even if Continued, Will but Slightly Affect American Exports.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The information in the possession of the department of agriculture regarding the British Government's decision to buy only home-grown beef for its army...

Among officials here there is no disposition to accredit the reasons that actuated the new policy to any dissatisfaction with American meats.

Secretary Hay has called to Ambassador Chamberlain's attention the reason for the order of the British government, a measure which excludes the American refrigerated beef heretofore used.

INTERVIEW WITH WILSON. Secretary Wilson said today that everything the administration can do in the matter is being done.

"But, I cannot understand," he said, "why the British government has taken this step. They know that our grain-buffet is the kind that is shipped to them. There must be some reason that is not apparent on the surface."

BRITISH EXPLANATION. LONDON, April 12.—The British war office confirms the report that it is going to try the experiment of supplying its army with only home-grown beef.

The director of contracts, a major, said to a representative of the Associated Press: "The new rule applies only to refrigerated beef, hitherto bought in the open market at London."
