ation is founded on fact, and that the 'Great Teacher, the Jesus Christ, did rise from the tomb, for, if it is true, it is the most beneficent of all teachings that the world has ever known.' Surely these two great representative minds of the Old World, or rather of the thought and wisdom of the Old World, by their modern comment, their utterances to the impetuous mind of the West. NOTABLE GATHERINGS. The International Association of Kindergarten is in session here, and is fairly well attended. The addresses seem to be confined to local talent and to members. No such sessions as were indicated upon the community at the meeting of kindergarten here by the erratic president of Clark university, some two years ago, are deemed probable. He is not on the programme. The general opinion seems to be that the good work is going forward, and while it suffers in some places by the opposition of those ignorant of its purpose, and in other places by the folly of its ignorant defenders, yet the kindergarten is getting a better and stronger hold upon the people. A far more notable gathering, however, is the convention of the representatives of Catholic colleges of the United States. The president of the conference is the Rt. Rev. Thomas Conaty, rector of the Catholic university at Washington, D. C. The object of the conference is to unify Catholic schools, and representatives of the Jesuit, the Benedictine and the Augustinian systems are in attendance. An excellent paper on the 'Catholic High School Movement' was read by the Rev. James A. Burro, of Holy Cross college, Washington, but the ablest address was that of President Conaty, who urged the high school movement most forcibly. He called attention to the state of high school and even college development; to the tendency to do away with the college by uniting the high school directly with the university; to the tendency of the universities to control the state schools, to dictate the examination of teachers, and to demand the university degree or approval as a condition of appointment, and pointed out that the high school is a most necessary link between the parochial school and the college. His address was most instructive, and renews in minds not interested in the Catholic faith, as well as in the minds of the Catholics themselves, the old but ever important question, 'Is secular education sufficient?' Shall the state alone, independent of home and the church, attempt the education of its youth? This question does not imply that there should be a union between church and state in this matter, but it does appeal to those who feel that the perfect character requires the assistance of moral and religious training. The final answer to this question has not been given, and all thoughtful men must consider it. PRINCE KROPOTKIN. Strange changes take place in public sentiment regarding men and the views they hold. This is notably true of Prince Peter Kropotkin, socialist-anarchist, who this week, if his health permits, will be welcomed in Chicago and will make various addresses—one before the students of the university. He is an eminent authority on sociology. He is to the extent of his ability philanthropic. He is naturally of a genial and kindly nature, but he is a socialist, and so very strong is his belief in the doctrine, that to him anarchy represents true socialism, and in order to attain it, he advocates the use of nihilistic means. Whether are we tending? Socialism is by no means anarchy—but, on the contrary, requires the strongest kind of a government in order to assure the true patriot treatment of all its subjects. But let us concede that it is not paternalism, but anarchy, that gives to human beings the happiest and most favorable conditions and relations; that natural laws, operating by universal consent and acquiescence afford the ideal after which we should strive, are we willing to accept the doctrine of nihilism in order to get rid of the many symptoms of deterioration, at least judged by the old standards; authority is not respected as formerly; laws are not all enforced; order is not preserved; often to speak of rules of order, of the constitution, of the enforcement of law is to provoke a sneer, or a smile, or pity or contempt. Are we quite sure that it is safe to venture so far as to give encouragement even to a good man so mistaken and misled that he sees no good in government; but, on the contrary, an evil so great that violent destruction is justifiable? —A.
