GETS IN MEDAL OF HONOR

SERGEANT HELMS, OF THE MARINES, TWICE SAVES COMRADES FROM DROWNING

NEW SET OF ARMY RULES

Old Regulations Had Become Obsolete Through the Disappearance of the Frontier and the Absorption of New Colonies.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The case of Sergeant J. H. Helms, of the marine corps, who recently was recommended by Capt. Rockwell, of the flagship Chicago, for a medal of honor and a gratuity, as a reward for rescuing Ishi Tomizi, a warrant officer's cook, from drowning in the harbor of Montevideo last January, developed an interesting correspondence, which has just been made public. In forwarding his recommendation, which was endorsed by Admiral Schley, Capt. Rockwell called attention to the fact that this was the second display of heroism exhibited by Sergeant Helms, he previously having jumped overboard from a tug in a rough sea to save Second-class Fireman W. Gallagher from drowning. Admiral Crowhillsfield, chief of the bureau of navigation, in referring the papers to Secretary Long, expressed the opinion that medals of honor should only be bestowed for "extraordinary heroism," and stated that "the conditions of the vessel being at anchor and the sea smooth enough for the crew to be permitted to engage in swimming exercises, suggests that Sergeant Helms could not have been in imminent danger in the rescue of the man above mentioned." However, the report of the executive officer of the Chicago distinctly stated that the cook was "in imminent danger of drowning, no one else being near him." Judge Advocate General Linsley, in rendering an opinion on the subject suggested that the views of Erac, Gen. Cuyler, the commandant of the marine corps, be ascertained. These were to the effect that Sergeant Helms "displayed extraordinary heroism in saving lives at the risk of his own and it is earnestly recommended that he be awarded the medal of honor and gratuity referred to."

Secretary Long concurred in the opinion.

TOUR OF THE PRESIDENT

ITINERARY OF MCKINLEY'S TRIP TO THE PACIFIC IS COMPLETELY MAPPED OUT

START IS MADE APRIL 29

Yellowstone Park Will Be Visited on the Return, but the Twin Cities Are Not on the Map.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The president, Mrs. McKinley and party will leave Washington by the Southern railway Monday morning, April 29, at 10:20 o'clock, for a tour to the Pacific coast, and return, covering a period of between six and seven weeks. They will have a train consisting of a private car for the president and Mrs. McKinley, two Pullman compartment cars, two Pullman sleepers, a dining car and a combination car. Col. L. S. Brown, general agent of the Southern railway, will accompany the party from here to New Orleans, and from New Orleans to Portland, Or., Mr. E. O. McCormick, passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific lines.

The members of the cabinet will accompany the president with the exception of Secretaries Gage and Root and Attorney General Knox, the personnel including Secretary and Mrs. Hay, Postmaster General and Mrs. Smith, Secretary and Mrs. Long, Secretary and Mrs. Hitchcock and Secretary and Miss Wilson, Miss Mary Barber, Mr. Henry T. Scott, Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Moore, Secretary and Mrs. Cortlyou, Dr. and Mrs. Rixey, Assistant Secretary Barnes, Mr. M. A. Dignam, several stenographers, representatives of the press associations, three illustrated weeklies, the Washington dailies, the president's representative of the press of San Francisco. The party will also be accompanied by Mr. Marean, manager of the Western Union Telegraph company at Washington, and Mr. Bibbe, manager of the Postal Telegraph Cable company.

BY WAY OF MEMPHIS.

The party will go by way of Alexandria, Charlottesville, Lynchburg and Roanoke, Va.; Huntsville, Decatur and Tusculum, Ala.; and Corinth, Miss., arriving at Memphis, Tenn., at 4:30 p. m. Tuesday, April 30. A stay of several hours will be made in Memphis, the party leaving there during the night for New Orleans, going by way of Vicksburg and Jackson, reaching New Orleans at 4:30 p. m. the 1st of May, and remaining there until 6 p. m. the following day. On the evening of the 1st the president will attend a banquet and will probably deliver a short address. On the second

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The monthly statements of the imports and exports of the United States issued by the treasury bureau of statistics shows that during the month of March, 1901, the imports of merchandise amounted to \$539,088, of which \$35,790,386 was free of duty. The total is a decrease from March, 1900, of \$7,299,069. The exports of domestic merchandise amounted to \$122,290,570, a decrease of \$3,450,000. The gold imports amounted to \$2,452,012, an increase of \$500,000. The gold exports amounted to \$450,259, a decrease of \$999,000. Silver imports amounted to \$2,731,732, a decrease of \$100,480. Silver exports were \$5,150,186; decrease, \$300,000.

INTO THE FROZEN SEAS.

Walter Wellman Discusses Arctic and Antarctic Expeditions.

LONDON, April 13.—Walter Wellman sailed for New York today from Southampton on board the American line steamer St. Louis, after a visit to Norway, where he inspected the steamer Magdalena, now being refitted at the yards where Dr. Nansen's Fram was built. Mr. Wellman said the Magdalena will sail for the Arctic regions this year or next, "but," he added, "I do not know whether I shall command her or not."

Mr. Wellman says there is no truth in the report that Dr. Nansen and the Duke of Abruzzi are going on an expedition together. Dr. Nansen has no Arctic plans on hand, while the Duke of Abruzzi is at present confining his ambition to the Antarctic regions.

Glass Blowers to Get a Raise.

PITTSBURGH, April 13.—Arrangements are practically concluded for the holding of a wage conference between the window glass producers and their workmen. The wage committee will this year arrange the scale for the four trades engaged in glassmaking. It is said that the manufacturers have proposed a substantial advance over the present wage scale, and that the larger proportion of the advance will be given to the blowers.

LAUNCHING OF THE OHIO.

The president will be met at San Francisco by the mayor and citizens' committee. The program for the stay in San Francisco provides for a reception that night and a visit on Wednesday to the University of California, and Oakland. Thursday a visit to Mount Tamalpais and a reception of various societies in the afternoon. The third night the president will attend the banquet of the Ohio society. Friday morning a school children's reception will be held, and the president and party will visit Ocean Beach. In the afternoon a reception has been arranged by the Knights Templar. Saturday morning will witness the launching of the battleship Ohio, which is the objective point of the president's trip. Following the launching the party will attend a luncheon at the Union League club, and at night will be held the citizens' banquet. Sunday will be spent in receiving the morning party. The party will leave San Francisco for Portland, Or., stopping about two hours at Stockton, and spending the evening at Sacramento. Brief stops will be made the next day at Redding, Elsie and Ashland, and Salem, Or., will be reached on the morning of Wednesday, May 22.

The party will reach Portland a few hours and will reach Portland that afternoon at a little after 2 o'clock.

ON PUGET SOUND.

Thursday morning, the 23rd, the president will leave Portland at 9 o'clock for Tacoma, going by way of Chehalis Centralia and Olympia, stopping about an hour at the state capital, and reaching Tacoma late in the afternoon. The night will be spent in Tacoma, and the following morning the party will leave Tacoma for Seattle at about 2 p. m. The remainder of the day the party will stay in Seattle, and late that night will leave for Spokane and return to Seattle on the morning of May 25. The party will remain in Walla Walla, and on Monday the president will make a stop for a drive and a visit to Spokane Falls. The party will leave Spokane at 2 p. m., and arriving at Butte early the next morning. The morning will be spent in Butte, and Helena will be reached late in the afternoon. After several hours in Helena the train will run to Cinnibar during the night and in the morning the party will be taken by stage to Yellowstone Park. Between two and three days will be spent in the park, and if the weather is favorable a visit will be made to the
