FIRST GAME OF SEASON

EMPIRE WILL CALL "PLAY BALL" AT LEXINGTON PARK TODAY

SAINTS WILL SHOW SCHOLARS

Every Loyal Rooter in St. Paul is Expected to be on Hand and Do His Duty.

The empire will call "play ball" at 3 o'clock this afternoon at Lexington park and then the season will be on in real earnest.

True, it will not be the opening of the league season, but the league team will be there, and it has been so long since the local rooters have had a chance to shake the dirt up out of University avenue.

And, speaking of welcomes, the candidates for positions on Capt. Ryan's team should be given a hearty one. It will be the first appearance here for many of them, and it will give them a good impression of the support that they are to have, and they, in turn, will respond with the right article of ball.

No use to tell the fans how to welcome "Big Bill" Wilson and "Father" Werden and one or two others who are well known favorites here. It is to be hoped that this afternoon will be bright and sunny and just a trifle warmer than the past few days.

The lineup of the league team will be just as it was given in the column of yesterday. The university men will line up as follows: Chilton, catcher; Freeman and Hammer, pitchers; Metcalf, first base; Solter, second base; Cameron, short; Plym, third base; Cameron, left field; Varco, center field; Hurley, right field.

Very little has been said about the material in the line-up, but it is understood that the men have been hard at work for some time and that they are in shape to make it decidedly interesting for the locals.

Capt. Ryan's colts put in a day of good, hard work at Lexington yesterday. During the afternoon the eighteen men on the team were split into two squads and practiced among themselves.

No one kept any particular track of the score, for the men were more interested in the material in the line-up than in the score. Considering the condition of the grounds, which are still soft and wet, some good clean ball was played.

Capt. Ryan contented himself with acting as umpire and occasionally giving a few pointers to some of the youngsters about handling the ball and getting over the ground between the bases.

Magill, Cox, Myroslak and Fraser were all given a couple of innings each behind the bat. Andrews was on first for one of the games and made a good impression on a few fans who were out to see the practice.

"Indian" Roberts covered left field in good shape and also went behind the bat for an inning.

A game has been arranged for Sunday afternoon between the league team and Manager Whitmore's city team.

Capt. Ryan has not decided just how he will line his men up for this game, but it is probable that the players will be in about the same positions as in the practice game.

The lineup of the city team will be as follows: O'Malley and Clayton, catchers; Cook and Bastel, pitchers; Williams, first base; Martin, second base; Berg, short; McGinnis, third base; left field; Murphy, center field; Thompson, right field.

This game will be called at 3 o'clock and should bring out a good bunch of fans.
