REHEARING IS GRANTED.

Subject to Certain Conditions Iron Ore Cases Will Be Reopened.

The long-delayed question as to the reopening of the iron ore rate cases at last has been decided by the railroad and warehouse commissioners, and subject to certain conditions, a rehearing will be granted.

According to the terms of the order, all of the three roads involved in the case to be reopened are to file by June 20, complete schedules of the iron ore rates in effect from points on their lines to ore docks. The rates in question, the Duluth, Missabe & Northern, the Duluth & Iron Range, and the Eastern Railroad of Minnesota, must also file an acknowledgment, admitting the jurisdiction of the commission in regard to the rates.

Section 2. Any person who now is or hereafter shall be licensed to sell intoxicating liquors within the limits of any room within the corporate limits of the city of St. Paul, who shall, either by himself, his agent, or by any other person, permit any minor child not accompanied by its parents or other person of legal age to remain in any place or room where the sale of intoxicating liquors is or may be licensed, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty dollars.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication in the City of St. Paul, and shall remain in force until the expiration of the term of office of the Board of Aldermen April 2, 1901.

It is further resolved, That whereas it is the duty of the Board of Aldermen to consider and report upon the reasonableness of rates and classifications now in force on the Duluth & Iron Range railroad and the Duluth, Missabe & Northern railway for the transportation of all kinds and classifications of freight articles between the points on the lines of said railroads in the state of Minnesota.

It is further resolved, That whereas it is the duty of the Board of Aldermen to consider and report upon the reasonableness of rates and classifications now in force on the Duluth & Iron Range railroad and the Duluth, Missabe & Northern railway companies, will affect the rates on the Eastern Minnesota railway, and as the latter railway has appeared and asked leave to intervene.

It is therefore further resolved, That said Eastern Minnesota Railway company be and the same is hereby allowed to appear and be heard in this matter, and furnish such evidence and present to the commission such facts and arguments as it may deem proper.

That the date for hearing all the matters hereinbefore referred to will be fixed by the ruling of the stipulation hereinbefore mentioned.

RATE TO THE SEABOARD.

Canada Atlantic Reported to Be About to Withdraw Its Differential.

If the Chicago Great Western adopts last year's differential lake and rail rate to be a hundred pounds to the seaboard, it will be the only road doing so as the Canada Atlantic, which was the only one to announce these rates, is said to be about to withdraw them, the reason being, it is understood, that the road that without the sanction of the association, is likely that the present rate of 70 cents will be maintained.

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IRRITATION AT WALTERSEE.

Allies' Commander Has Sent Out Too Many Expeditions.

LONDON, May 7.—The rumors that the relations between Germany and Russia are strained on account of slighting upon the part of Count von Waldersee are admitted by the foreign office. Though it is admitted that the majority of the powers are considered irritated by the field marshal's numerous expeditions, it is not believed this had led to any serious misunderstanding. It may be authoritatively stated that the British diplomats had any reason to believe the rumors of strained relations between Germany and Great Britain it would cause them no trouble to discredit them.

The information received, however, did not warrant Lord Hamilton in thinking the American locomotives on Indian railroads had been found generally unsatisfactory.
