WINE-KEEPER IN HIS LOFT

SOME RARE VINTAGES THAT MONEY CANNOT BUY AT THIS TIME

WINES THAT WERE INHERITED

Not far from the hurly-burly of the stock exchange is a wine merchant whose business has been handed down like a title of nobility, says the New York Post. Almost a century ago some of his family had a warehouse on this spot and when they were gone the father

of the present wine merchant took it up, and after him his son. Thus he came into a knowledge of all the choice vintages of the last 100 years, and many of the century before that, and proved that although a man may not live to see 100 years of a raven's life, he may by having the right kind of father keep a cask of wine for more than that length of time. The winekeeper is up two flights of stairs in one of those low, dimly lighted buildings that are still left over from old New York. His office is scarcely bigger than a hall bedroom, but he has also two interior rooms, with a soft, sweet-smelling atmosphere, where he keeps his private collection, and many bottles of rare old wines that he is "treating" for patrons. His specialty, as has been intimated, is caring for wines, and in this connection his business might almost be called a wine hospital.

John and showed it half full of heavy lees, looking through the green glass almost like tealaves, and the other half an amber liquid. Wetting a tall, slender glass and taking a rubber tube from a shelf, he dropped one end of the tube through the neck of the demijohn, drew the air through it to a certain point, and let a few bubbles of sparkling sherry siphon into the glass. There was only the slightest sign of turbidity about it. "And the lees," said he, "are very valuable." Then, after washing the tube, he dropped it into a cask of port lying comfortably on its side, and the liquid which flowed out bore only the slightest traces of having once been muddy and dark.

genuine wine was like a long time ago. The winekeeper does it mostly by smell for his own purposes. Given a number of vials of different growths and vintages, he sets them aside as sherry or port after he has had a chance to ruin their digestion by tasting. "I will show you a sherry that has lain in the cask for many, many years," said he to a visitor, "so long that it may become heavy and dark, quite unlike the sherry which one sees on the table of today." With this he took down from a shelf a tall bottle of "Andalucian Nectar," and poured out a portion of the deepest amber, thick almost like a cordial and leaving a stringent taste in the mouth.

"These are no doubt very costly," the visitor said. "They are not for sale," said the keeper of wines. "There is nothing for sale here. But if they were for sale, no doubt they would bring a large amount. I will show you some Amontillado, called N. P. U. (no plus ultra), which was offered to me once at \$1,000 a butt of 101 gallons. Now you have tasted probably the most expensive sherry in the world, which would bring \$50 a dozen bottles at a club as ordinarily sold.

"CURIOUS BOTTLES. Besides his unusual collection of Madeiras, sherries and Bordeaux, the winekeeper has a curious company of bottles, saved from the time when bottles were in their crudest form, and which the Arts club ought to have in its present exhibition. One which he believes to be the oldest bottle used for holding liquor in this country came from Nassau, in the Bahamas, much longer ago than anybody can remember. It is a broad-bottomed bottle which held a shaly filled with snuff. It is made of a coarse, seaweed-colored glass and is shaped somewhat like a chestnut standing upright upon its broad end. There is a broad-bottomed bottle which held Madeira in Charleston in 1810, and a Viennese bottle 125 years old, whose slender, graceful curves have been supplanted today by a more commercial shape. The first American gin-bottle, from the Schuchardt estate, is a corked pigeon shape which is delightful to the

eye. Among the later bottles are some which constituted the product of the bottle maker's art when impressed glass first came into use. On each side figures are molded into the glass with that gay liberty of dedication which must have taken possession of the glass worker pressing to his artistic instinct. There are a number of "railroad bottles," the regular being at that time (as now, to those who follow Wall street most in the public eye. On one a wagon running on rails and drawn by a horse is depicted on both sides with the motto: "Success to the Railroad." On another the same primary arrangement is shown, combined with the railroad at Lowell, and on the reverse of the bottle a spread eagle, with the motto: "Never surrenders." A spread eagle and what appears to be a Masonic shrine, a fruit basket and horns of plenty and two trees, one in leaf, the other bare, representing "Summer and Winter" are other two-faced designs. A large bottle, which in these days would contain Holland gin, is impressed with a series of monies, at their prayers. It was called the "Apostles bottle," but it drew fire from the Schuchardt estate, who had it, by edict, out of general use.
