MADE HIT WHEN IT WAS NEEDED AND WON THE GAME

FANS GIVE HIM OVATION

Cogan replaced Parker in the sun field and played a fine game of ball both in the field and at bat. It was a decided improvement in the play that has been seen in that field and was appreciated by the fans.
