Twelve of the Number Descended the Pit as Rescuers Only to Perish Themselves.

NO HOPE OF SAVING ANY OF THE ENTOMBED MINERS IN THE BLAZING PORT ROYAL MINE.

GOV. NORTHCOTT'S ADDRESS.

After the rendition of the song by the quartette, consisting of K. A. Hils, Dr. J. H. Hite, Dr. E. M. Hopkins and Prof. I. L. James, Head Consul Northcott responded to the addresses of a welcome, saying: "Fellow Neighbors: Away off in the mountains of West Virginia rises the Monongahela river, and in a flow by the grave of my mother. But as its waters wash its banks, change no remnant of West Virginia, but on to join the Ohio and past Illinois, the home of my wife and my children, I hear not the name of Illinois; and on into the great Gulf past the great state of Missouri, I hear not the name of any state. And as the Atlantic washes at the feet of the vine-clad hills of New England, I hear not the name of a state. No, amidst the mountains of Pennsylvania, across the broad lands, and going over the tablelands of Ohio, amidst the wide fields, waving like the ocean waves, of the Dakotas, amidst the beautiful lakes and groves of Minnesota, the grain fields of Nebraska and Iowa in Kansas, near the hot winds of Oklahoma, away out on the Pacific coast, in the wide expanse between the river and ocean, I hear no name of any state. But I hear a grand anthem, the song of the American republic, and to the Modern Woodmen of America, (Great applause and cheer.)"
