

PROGRESS OF THE PLAGUE

OFFICIAL REPORTS TO THE UNITED STATES MARINE HOSPITAL SERVICE

HIGH MORTALITY IN INDIA

Believed That the Climate of the Epidemic in Cape Town Has Been Passed—Fever in Central America.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The latest official mail advices to the marine hospital service, based on statistics for the week ended May 11, report a belief that the maximum of the plague epidemic at Cape Town, South Africa, has been reached, and that the number of cases from now on will lessen. This report says there can be no doubt that the infection of Cape Town has been very general, and that since the beginning of the outbreak there has been a total of 610 cases and 275 deaths.

During the week ended May 11 there were thirty-eight cases and twenty-five deaths from the plague at Cape Town. In "contact camps," on April 12, there were still 745 persons under observation. Plague among the natives in Cape Colony has diminished, and the plan of keeping them apart in "locations," in which 5,000 families are accommodated on April 10, has borne good results. Under date of May 18, Consul General Mason, at Berlin, reports that from April 15 no unvaccinated person has been allowed to enter the docks at Cape Town.

According to the port authorities, 5,446 rats have been killed in the Cape Town docks. Plague has been shown to be present in many of them.

PLAGUE IN INDIA.

The fearful ravages of the plague in British India are increasing. During the week ended April 12, there were 1,947 new cases, and the total number of cases reported since the beginning of the epidemic in Bombay, where the increase is notable in Karachi, where in the same week 230 fresh plague cases and 30 deaths occurred.

In the same week 715 deaths were reported and 82 others suspected in Bombay city. There are many thousands of plague deaths reported from other provinces of India, the largest number being in the Punjab district. In the Punjab, during the week ended April 12, there were 47,681 cases reported. The plague is prevalent in various parts of China, in one district of which (Lam-Ko) more than 1,000 deaths were reported between Feb. 14 and March 25.

YELLOW JACK IN COSTA RICA.

A report from Marine Hospital Surgeon Goodman, at Port Limon, Costa Rica, announces that no passengers are now being taken by the steamship company, and that the United States. An official report to the Costa Rican national authorities tells of the prevalence of yellow fever at Liberia, a city of 6,000 inhabitants in the "hot lands" of the Pacific coast, province of Guanacaste, Costa Rica. Communication between Liberia and San Jose, the national capital, has been suspended since the outbreak of the disease at Port Limon, is difficult.

OFFICERS DENY IT

SAY TALK OF EXTENSIVE MILITARY STORES IN SECOND-HAND GOODS IS POINTS TO THEIVING FROM GOVERNMENT.

DETECTIVES SAY IT IS TRUE

Assert Large Amount of Military Stores in Second-Hand Goods Points to Thieving From Government.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Capt. A. W. Kimball, post quartermaster at the Presidio, made the following statement today in regard to the alleged fraud in the sale of quartermaster's supplies belonging to the government. He is a military officer that is concerned in this matter, yet no one has yet made any inquiry of me. I am the only bonded officer at the post, and the only one who is authorized to disburse money. If there has been anything irregular, I would be pleased to give all the assistance in my power in the search for the guilty men if there are any.

"All the government things sold in the pawnshops are sold by discharged soldiers from the returning volunteer regiments. I have observed the amounts of the soldiers selling their clothing for a long time. One of the puzzling and perplexing things in army management is the sale of the soldiers from selling their clothing."

"I am confident that no quartermaster's sergeant or civilian employe is implicated in the selling of a shoe string." "A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Abe Abrams, son of Louis Abrams, the second-hand dealer, who, with another son, is in custody. Detective Reynolds reports to me that the second-hand stores and those who deal in the class of goods stolen from the army, and that those who have not yet been visited by Col. Mann are hurrying to cover what government goods they have. The quantities which they were able to supply their customers makes it seem conclusive to me that there are some one or more having access to the quartermaster's department in collusion with them."

"They will have a hard time explaining away the goods against them." "The announcement that the warehouse full of stolen goods has been found, which was made yesterday on authority of Capt. Seymour, has been found to be erroneous."

"The person who informed the captain was told to telephone that the property recovered was being stored in the locality mentioned, but he neglected his instructions, and sent the message wrong."

WHAT SHAFER HAS TO SAY.

Speaking of the alleged extensive frauds in disposing of military supplies supposed to have been stolen, Gen. Shafter said: "I am of the opinion that the goods found by the police were purchased from the soldiers passing in and out of this post. More than 60,000 men have passed through this post, during the war, and one man in every ten of these soldiers sold to dealers a pair of shoes, 60 pairs would thus be placed in the hands of the public, but military rule applies to shirts and blankets."

"Notwithstanding the fact that those having government property wrongfully in their possession can be prosecuted on a charge of felony and sentenced to from one to five years' confinement, there are plenty of men willing to take the chance. The goods are first class and can be purchased from the soldiers at a ridiculously low figure."

MACHINISTS FILE PROTEST.

Object to Students Taking Places of Strikers. CINCINNATI, June 12.—The Machinists' union of Cincinnati, Ohio, today sent a letter to Gov. Beckham, in which they appeal for an investigation of the action of a special committee, made up of members of the state legislature, who claim to be taking the places of the striking machinists. The officers of the union are protesting against the action of the committee, and that they are working without any pay whatsoever, and that they will investigate the matter and have the strikers released.
