

OMAHA RAILROAD SPUR

WEST SIDE TRACK ASSURED BY DECISION OF JUDGE KELLY
BATHS TO BE SAFEGUARDED
Approaches Are to Be Protected as City Council May Direct—Commissioners Appointed to Condemn Land.

Work on the spur track which the Omaha company intends building on the West side will be commenced in a few days, all legal objections having been disposed of by a decision handed down by Judge Kelly yesterday morning.

The case came up in the form of a petition on the part of the railway company for the appointment of commissioners to condemn certain lands needed for the track. This petition the court granted, and all that now remains is the formal sanction of the council for the securing of right of way privileges.

That the new road will be appreciated by the business interests on the West side was clearly made evident in the discussions of the Chamber of Commerce, and W. A. Abbott, general manager for the company, has stated that he has received letters from as many as twenty business firms containing inquiries as to the proposed spur, and offering to locate along the line of the new track.

In deference to the protests raised by the city and the health commissioner, certain conditions are imposed on the road, among them the following: The approaches to the public baths must be safeguarded as the city council may direct.

The elevation of the railway's right of way shall be the same as the elevation of the present footbridge, now forming an entrance to the city from the river.

The extreme width of the lands to be taken by the company for its right of way between the river and the West side of Wabasha street, shall be thirty feet on top of the fill, or railroad embankment.

In the approaches to and passage beneath the Wabasha street bridge, the land in excess of what is owned by the city shall be held by the company subject to the right of any other railroad company, with the consent of the city to occupy or use the same, and the Omaha road shall build its embankment so as not to unnecessarily interfere with the passage of any other road or highway.

The line will run from the main track of the company up the river on the West side, beneath the bluff, thence along the West side levee, crossing the river under the Wabasha street bridge.

The Judge in his finding for the company stated that he regarded the line as of prime necessity to the city, and as every public interest of St. Paul. He also praised Dr. Ohage for his zeal on behalf of the public baths. The commissioners condemn the land and make report are James J. Egan, E. M. Ware and L. Bayard.
