GERMAN SINGING SOCIETIES OF NORTHERN WISCONSIN MEET AT MARSHFIELD

TEN THOUSAND VISITORS

Accommodation Not Sufficient for Crowds at Closing Concert—Next Meet Will Be at Merrill.

MARSHFIELD, Wis., June 23.—The singing societies which today generally conceded to have been the most successful in every way of any fest ever held by the North Wisconsin Senger-Zeiskis, Merrill, was chosen as the next Sengerfest city, winning out of the first ballot at the business meeting.

A more pleasant day could not have been chosen for the big day of the meeting. Special trains brought 10,000 visitors to the city. An immense audience attended the second and last concert this afternoon. The pavilion would not accommodate all who desired admission. The programme consisted of several mass choruses by about twenty solos by Prof. Jacob Reuter, of Wausau, the violinist, and Miss Alice Gross, of Stevens Point, soprano soloist, and selections by the different societies and the Second Regiment orchestra.

FEAR THAT HE IS DROWNED.

Young Man, Last Seen Fishing, Can Not Be Found.

ALBERT LEA, Minn., June 23.—(Special.)—About 10 o'clock a young white man named Albert Lea, of Waseca county, was seen fishing in a lake about twenty miles from here in Waseca county, and he has not since been seen, although diligent search has been made. It is believed that he is drowned, and parties have gone out to search for the body, but the chances of finding it are not the best, as the water is very deep.

MURDERER IDENTIFIED.

Prisoner Recognized as Perpetrator of Two Murders.

LAREDO, Tex., June 23.—Sheriff Ayant, of Attolosa county, and Deputy Sheriff Choate, of Karnes county, with several members of the posse, arrived here this morning at 10 o'clock this evening, to identify the man captured by Capt. Rogers and R. P. K. Merriam, from the prison at Brown yesterday. Among the men who arrived this evening were two who know the prisoner. One of them, William Lourey, of Bastrop county, has known Cortez since 1882, and Deputy Sheriff Choate, of Karnes county, has known him for several years. They both positively identified the prisoner and said there is absolutely no doubt that the man whom they have known all these years as Gregorio Cortez, and who killed Sheriff Morris, of Karnes county, and Sheriff Glover, of Gonzales county. The murderer will be surrendered to the officers from the interior.

ESTIMATES STILL GROWING.

Losses Likely to Mount Up Into the Millions.

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., June 23.—Bodies are being washed down the stream, where they were washed ashore. When it is considered that the Elkhorn river is so small that it barely fulfills enough water to flush the coke ovens when in its normal condition some idea of the extent of the downpour of rain can be formed. The railroad company now estimates the damage to its tracks between this city and Vivian at over \$500,000. There is at least 10 miles of track bordering the river that cannot be heard from, and there is no means of communication intact. Communication has been established as far west as Ennis, this being through about one-fourth of the stricken district.

HIGHLY PROBABLES QUANTITATIVE HAVOC

HAS CALLED HEIR TO PARTICIPATE IN STATE AFFAIRS WHILE HE NURSES HIS GOUT

KAISER TO VISIT RUSSIA

Czar Has Little Hope of Driving British Flag From Persian Gulf—Agricultural Syndicate Has Been Formed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Tuesday, June 4.—News comes from Teheran that the invitation extended by the shah to his heir to visit the affairs of state is the result of the probable incurable illness of the former. The shah's heir is not believed to be immediately endangered by his hereditary gout, but it will necessarily partly incapacitate him for business.

In spite of the usual denials the visit of Emperor William of Germany to Russia this summer is not regarded as beyond the probabilities. The maneuvers at Grodno will embrace several army corps, and it is essential to the Finnish coast, combining army and navy movements, promises unusual interest. On the other hand, it is denied that the emperor has any invitations to the Balkan sovereigns.

MINING TOWNS WIPED OUT.

Number of Prosperous Hamlets Destroyed to Have Been Destroyed.

ROANOK, Va., June 23.—The railroad people say it will be at least five days before their lines are open for trains. They have been sending work trains to the storm-stricken district from all directions. The loss of the railroad is estimated at \$500,000. A private message from Bramwell, W. Va., on Simpson's creek, says there has been great damage done there, but no loss of life is reported up to the time the telegram was sent.

DAMAGE AT PITTSBURG.

Lightning and Floods Do Fatal Work in Allegheny Valley.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 23.—The storm which visited this county on Saturday afternoon carried with it deaths by drowning and deaths by electric shock. Floods that caused much damage to property on the Allegheny and its tributaries, and have, every part of the county suffered. One storm broke about 2:30 o'clock after darkness had gradually been falling. A full of rain fell, and until then had been a beautiful one. The rain was very heavy, the wind strong and often the lightning seemed to be playing right over the heads of the people.

DAMAGE AT TAZEWELL.

Clinch River Higher Than Ever Before—Disastrous Landslide.

TAZEWELL, Va., June 23.—Climch river has done an immense amount of damage and has swept away many mill dams. It has not been so high within the memory of any living man. An immense landslide occurred on the farm of A. J. Higginbotham, three miles from Tazewell, which swept away the house of Paris Vandike. So sudden was the catastrophe that the inmates had no time to get out. Two of the children, one a young man of seventeen years and the other four—were killed or drowned. The bodies of the children were found a half mile and a half below where the house had stood. Another son, seven years old, died. A little girl was carried half a mile in a mass of stones, logs and other debris, and is also slightly injured.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 23.—Central Indiana was visited by a terrific electric storm last night, but beyond the havoc it played with the telegraph and telephone wires, little damage was reported. Telegraphic communication was practically at a standstill a greater part of the night. The storm was preceded by an intensely hot day, and was accompanied by a deluge of rain.

BRIDGES DOWN AND SERVICE CRIPPLED.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 23.—The Norfolk and Western railroad officials here have no information regarding the disaster in the Virginia district, and the fact that great damage has been done to the road in the Pocahontas district, a number of bridges having been washed away. Orders were issued to accept no perishable freight for shipment to eastern points until the roads in the district have been made to run trains east of Kenova.

SICK TO BE PROTECTED.

Medical Officers Directed to Keep Hospitals Free from Insects.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Surgeon General Wyman has issued a general circular to medical officers of the marine hospital service, calling special attention to the importance of insects as factors in conveying disease. The circular says there is no longer doubt as to the relation of the mosquito to malarial diseases and to filarial fever, and that to a certain extent cholera may be conveyed by flies. Medical officers are directed to place mosquito nets over the beds of communicable diseased patients.

LOCAL BANDS OBJECT.

Minneapolis Musicians Don't Approve Banda Rossa Proposition.

Local musicians, particularly those who belong to the union, are much dissatisfied because the Banda Rossa has been engaged to play at Lake Harriet. Those who pay park taxes are very indignant and the levy of the union is being paid to pay the expenses of employing foreign musicians, when there are plenty of good musical organizations in the city who would be contented. Without attempt to detract from the merits of the Banda Rossa they insist that there are several bands now in Minneapolis which could furnish music that would be entirely satisfactory to the frequenters of the park, and that they are only inferior to the Banda Rossa in that they lack reputations and the favor of the park board.

Is Instantly Killed.

Charles Dahlberg, an unmarried man, thirty-seven years old, residing at 409 Thirty-third avenue north, and employed by the Dakota Lumber company, was almost instantly killed about 7:15 last evening. With a crew of men he was unloading logs from a Northern Pacific train at Thirty-sixth avenue north and the Mississippi river, when without warning one of the logs rolled down upon him, crushing his skull.
