PUTS ON CITY AIRS

VILLAGE OF THORPE HAS MUNICIPAL LIGHT AND WATER PLANTS

LATTER HAS PAID FOR ITSELF. Electric Lights to Be in Operation by Oct. 1, and Are Expected to Yield the City a Revenue.

THORPE, Wis., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—The solid brick power house, 36x50, with solid brick boiler house, 30x30, attached, of the Thorpe electric light plant, was completed today. A force of workmen is engaged in setting poles and wiring same for the thirteen 1500 candle power arc lights, while business houses and private residences are being wired preparatory to the introduction of lights as soon as the engine, boiler and dynamo have been put in.

Meters are to be used. The machinery derives an annual revenue from water-works system at a cost of \$7,500, every dollar of which, with the sole exception of \$500, has been paid for by the village. The village treasury derived from license moneys instead of a direct tax on the people. The water is supplied by a flowing spring thirty feet deep and twelve feet in diameter, and is of excellent quality. There is over one mile of six-inch mains, with eighteen double hydrants for fire protection.

ENJOINED BY KOHLSAAT

STRIKERS MUST NOT PICKET ALIEN-CHALMERS WORKS.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—The Alien-Chalmers plant secured an injunction from Judge Kohlsaat, in the United States circuit court, restraining the striking iron molders and machinists from picketing any of the plants of the company and from intimidating or showing violence toward any of the non-union workmen who were filling their places.

IN INTEREST OF SCIENCE

EXPERIMENT WITH YELLOW FEVER PREVENTATIVE.

DEAD IN ISLANDER WRECK

NO CHANCE IN STRIKE

STRIKERS AND TRUST OFFICERS BOTH CLAIM TO HAVE THE BEST OF IT

CONFERENCE AT PITTSBURG. Between Amalgamated Association Officials and Leaders of Other Unions—Members Are Reticent.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 23.—A summary of the steel strike tonight shows about the following conditions: This City, Star Mill—Two mills running; strikers say five more men left the plant and joined their ranks, but management positively denies the statement.

Wellsville—Situation unchanged; two mills running. Lisbon—Fires started in the plant. Manager George Evans says everything in readiness for start soon with plenty of men. Strikers vote today to remain out, and will be strongly urged to do so.

STRIKE LEADERS CONFIDENT

The conference of the labor leaders at the offices of the Amalgamated association today was the leading feature of the strike during the day. The officials of the organization all seemed pleased with the way things were moving, and one of them said somewhat mysteriously: "In another six days you will see a decided change in the situation that will do with greater effect on the train and in hurrying the final outcome of this struggle."

AFTER NINE YEARS

HIS BODY TIED TO A BOARD. In Order to Hold Him Erect on the Scaffold—Case Had Been Heard Three in Federal Supreme Court.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 23.—Charles W. Nordstrom was hanged today for the murder, Nov. 27, 1891, of William Mason. Shortly after 9:30 Nordstrom was taken to a room adjoining the death chamber. He wept continuously. He required the utmost efforts of four men to keep him on his feet.

CLAIMS AND COUNTER CLAIMS

Wanted for Assault

TAMPA, Fla., Aug. 23.—J. H. Mercer, convicted last May of assaulting George Taylor, a little girl, was hanged here at noon today. His neck was broken by the fall. He died declaring his innocence. His last words were a request that his wife be taken care of. Mercer is the first white man ever legally executed in Hillsborough county.

Power of the Press

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—As a result of the strong press campaign against the methods of the court-martial that tried the charges against the Kaiser, Emperor and Sergeant Hickey, accused of the murder of a cavalry Capt. von Krosigk, the military authorities in Berlin probably will be compelled to imprison the death sentence passed upon Sergeant Marten. It is believed that this will be the outcome, even if the whole trial should not be reopened.
