HEAVILY ADVOCATING THE RETURN OF STOLEN CHINESE ASTRONOMICAL INSTRUMENTS

WEEK'S GOSSIP OF BERLIN

"Project to Cross Under den Linden With an Electric Road Stairs"

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—The most lively topics of the week here have been the question of the return of the Chinese astronomical instruments taken from Peking, the proposed opening of Unter den Linden by an electric railroad, the reported protest of the Hungarian premier, Folman do Szell, against the proposed German tariff and the cruiser Gazelle incident.

The whole German press agrees that the astronomical instruments were illegally carried off. Even the Kreuz-Zeitung criticizes the action of the German government, and the Berliner Tageblatt and the Berliner Volks-Zeitung have taken an unlawful stand in good faith, but that does not settle the matter. The least that can be done is to deduct the value of the instruments from the Chinese indemnity.

The statement made some three weeks ago that the instruments were purchased and not looted has not been officially refuted. The Neueste Nachrichten says it is not sufficient to place the instruments at the disposal of the Chinese, and proposes to offer the instruments as a gift to China and replace them at Germany's expense on the spots from which they were taken, if China is unwilling to do so, and to deduct the amount from the indemnity.

The Vorwaerts triumphantly exclaims that China intends to leave the illegally acquired goods in Germany as a continual reminder of how Germany respects international law and that the honor of Germany demands that the instruments be taken back to China.

The Berliner Tageblatt refers to the unpleasantness of seeing the instruments placed near the historic windmill, which reminds people of the best traditions of "civilized justice."

The paper says: "At any rate, the unknown pillagers have served Germany badly."

General satisfaction is expressed at the report that Prince Ching has given up the idea of having the instruments and the emperor agrees as to the necessity for a change in the Chinese system of government and that reform edicts will be enforced upon the return of the instruments.

PROVIDED FOR BY THE EPISCOPAL CONVENTION. IN SESSION AT SAN FRANCISCO

IN THE NEW POSSESSIONS BISHOPS OF PORTO RICO AND THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS ARE CONSTITUTED BY THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—The triennial convention of the Episcopal church assembled considerable work today. The session of the house of deputies was opened by the reading of the constitution, which was adopted by the house of bishops, however, remained in session later, and their action will be reported in its effect. In recognition of the importance of the new possessions of the United States two new bishops were constituted. One of these, which consists of the islands of Porto Rico and Aqueduct, was named by the house of bishops of Antigua, who owes allegiance to the church of England. By the terms of a mutual agreement, the monetary consideration being only \$500, the bishop of Antigua withdraws his right to the religious control of the church in these islands and transfers all the church buildings to the Protestant Episcopal church of America. The second new bishopric is that of the Philippine Islands, which are recognized as being well worthy the attention of the church. The house of bishops also effected an important change by concurring in the action of the house of deputies in consenting to the division of the diocese of Massachusetts. A fact worthy of note is the old diocese, which gives \$100,000 in cash to the new one, besides turning over to it valuable church property.

The gift was raised entirely by voluntary contributions. The bishops also took action on the first seven amendments to the constitution already adopted by the deputies, all of them being affirmed with the exception of the fifth, which was temporarily held in abeyance. Consent was given to change the name of the diocese of Indiana to that of Indiana as no other state is within the boundary of the diocese. This, with the appointment of a committee to take into consideration the question of extending the diocese to admission to holy orders, constituted the chief work of the bishops.

An interesting feature of the day was the discussion of the proposed amendment by the reading of a proposed amendment to the constitution, which provides for the temporary use of other forms and directors of worship by congregation, not in union with this church, who are willing to accept the spiritual oversight of the bishop of the diocese or missionary district. An animated discussion of this provision followed, in which Dr. Huntington, Dr. Perkins, of Chicago, and others participated.

Dr. Parker, of Colorado, vigorously opposed the proposition. Rev. Dr. Alsop, of Long Island, spoke in favor of it. Rev. Dr. Rhode Island, argued for the amendment.

Rev. Dr. Olmsted, of Pennsylvania, did not think there was sufficient present demand for such a provision.

Dr. Cameron Mann thought that the bishops already had all the privileges and authority to be conferred by this legislation.

Judge Stevens, of Minnesota, said the work among the hundreds of thousands of Swedes in the Northwest was to amount to anything, liberty of use contemplated here was not allowed.

Some of the opponents of the measure pressed to see in it a menace to the solidity of the church through the extraordinary individual power it would confer on the bishop. Others declared it would open a way for the introduction of mass and other forms of Romish worship. Its champions asserted that the whole purpose of the proposed amendment was to give missionaries a freer scope in their efforts to bring within the church those converts who may be unable or unwilling to accept the Book of Common Prayer.

Considerable eloquence was developed by the debate, and when the hour of adjournment came the lay auditors were not tired of listening. The king's daughters held a session at St. Luke's church, being welcomed to the city by Bishop Nichols, of California. After communion service, reports were read, and the session being deferred until the next session.

LARGE ATTENDANCE. The fourth day of the triennial Episcopal convention opened today with a large attendance at the prayer service in Trinity church, which was presided over by Bishop Grafton, of Fond du Lac, Wis., assisted by Rev. Dr. Stuck, of Dallas, Tex. The house of bishops then convened at the triennial meeting, and the house of bishops, of Georgia, Thomas Underwood Dudley, bishop of Kentucky; Joseph Horstall Johnson, bishop of Los Angeles.

Two new missionary districts were created, one consisting of the islands of Porto Rico and Viques, and the other of the Philippine Islands.

The nominal consideration of \$750 was involved in the transfer. The bishops agreed with the deputies in the creation of a new diocese in Massachusetts.

The following committee was appointed to consider the general question of examination for courses of theological seminaries, for admission to holy orders: Bishop of Dallas, Southern Virginia, Tennessee, Massachusetts and the coadjutor bishop of Southern Ohio.

Adjourned until Monday.

Lowry, Atlanta, Ga.; Charles W. Fairbanks, Indianapolis; Henry C. Payne, Milwaukee; Henry M. Duffell, Detroit; George B. Cortelyou, Washington; Henry T. Scott, San Francisco; and Mr. Murray, of New York.

A meeting of the trustees has been called for the 14th inst. at Cleveland, Ohio, when it is expected that an organization will be perfected by the election of officers and the appointment of executive committees. This monument is to be erected at Canton, Ohio, the site of the late president. Already a considerable amount of money has been offered for the monument, and it is expected the trustees will be ready to begin the preliminary steps looking toward its erection soon after the meeting next Thursday.

TO SHINE ON SUNDAY

BALTIMORE SUN HAS DECIDED TO APPEAR ON THE SEVENTH DAY

MAKES EDITORIAL DEFENSE

Says the Sunday Newspaper is Demanded by a Great Majority of the Readers of Newspapers.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 5.—The Sun will hereafter issue a Sunday edition which is carefully weighed and has excited the greatest possible local interest. In explaining its reasons for the new departure, the Sun says in its editorial columns today:

"The Sun will begin tomorrow, Oct. 6, the issue of a Sunday edition. In departing upon a step which involved a departure from its long established custom of a weekly issue on the seventh day, it has been convinced not only that a Sunday issue is demanded by the great majority of its readers, but that issue will enlarge its field of usefulness. While fully honoring the sincerity of those who still oppose the publication of Sunday newspapers, we believe they are mistaken in their view which holds such a publication to be an evil per se, and which places in the same condemnation a well conducted and moral journal with those which are wholly frivolous and sensational. An untidy, unclean and demoralizing journal is on any day of the week, and a newspaper which helps to improve the world is a blessing, whether published on Sunday, Monday or any other day of the week."

"As for the Sun, while it hopes never to see Sunday lose its sacred character, or its influence for moral and spiritual good, it cannot accept as reasonable or helpful the old Puritan conception which made it a day of gloom and penance and which hedged it about not with the sunshine of divinity, but with severe restrictions of man's devious nature.
