CITY HAS PAID \$7,000 CHARGES

Notices Sent to Holders That No Interest Will Be Paid After Saturday—They Must Draw Their Money.

On and after Saturday the awards made in connection with the acquisition of the ground now known as Phalen park will have ceased to draw interest.

For some unknown reason the payment of these awards, which are in the neighborhood of \$7,000, has been hanging fire for a year or more.

So much information has leaked out since the meeting of the Adelphi club last Monday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. V. D. Turner, on Carroll street. The understanding at that meeting was that its action be kept a profound secret.

The colored clubwomen seem to be of the opinion that their white sisters have forced the color. They claim that the Adelphi asked for an application blank and information in regard to the conditions of membership, it was done simply in the way of acquiring a clearer and fuller knowledge in regard to the organizations of the state.

Prices today are 35 per cent higher than last year.

The old reliable apple pie will have a hard time maintaining its supremacy this winter in competition with some of the best varieties of apples which will be much more of a luxury than they were last year.

The supply of last year's good apples, which were advanced 35 per cent over the price of last year, and the indications are that within a week or so there will be a further advance.

This marked rise in price is due to the almost total failure of the apple crop in the Eastern states. In Michigan and New York the apple crop was so much of a failure as to yield scarcely enough for home consumption, and in Missouri the supply is very limited.

The apples on hand are mostly the fancy brands, which come from Washington, and include such well known varieties as Wolfe River, Twenty-ounce pippin, Snow, Grabenstein and Blue Pearl, all of which are especially good eating apples.
