MUST SHOW CAUSE

COMPROMISER'S REFUSAL TO SIGN FORRESTAL CONTRACT LEADS TO COMPLICATIONS

MANDAMUSED YESTERDAY In Accordance With Corporation Attorney's Opinion He Would Not Confirm Board of Works' Action.

Late yesterday afternoon Comptroller J. J. McCarty was served with papers in mandamus proceedings, citing him to appear before Judge Otis next Saturday and show cause why he refused to affix his signature to a contract awarded James Forrestal by the board of public works.

The contract in question involves the macadamizing of East Seventh street from Hope to Atlantic streets at a cost of nearly \$30,000 and has received more than its due share of publicity because of the fact that the award of contract by the board of public works was declared invalid in an opinion handed down by the legal department a few days ago.

The illegality of the award was based on the fact that the entire morning and afternoon sessions of its proceedings had failed to include the street railway company's portion of the street. Following this discovery, Corporation Attorney Markham refused to approve the contractor's bond action, instructed the members of the board not to officially sign the contract.

This order the board disregarded, and late yesterday afternoon the contractor bearing the signature of the board went to Mr. McCarty to be countersigned. This favor was refused and the mandamus proceedings followed almost immediately.

The outcome of the controversy will be watched with interest, as the legal department and Mr. McCarty have intimated that the matter will be carried to a higher court if defeat comes.

Lawler & Arnold are representing James Forrestal and hold that the action of the board was perfectly proper and legal. They claim that, the board can first award the contract for the city part and then follow it with the contract for the remainder.

IS IT PHILANTHROPY? FULLMAN COMPANY ADVOCATES INCREASING ITS OWN TAX. State Senator H. H. Horton appeared yesterday before the tax revision commission on behalf of the Pullman Car company, and spent the entire morning and a portion of the afternoon in setting forth the desires of that corporation with reference to revision of the laws as to the taxation of sleeping and palace car companies.

Senator Horton, in behalf of the Pullman company, argued in favor of a straight 2 per cent tax, based upon the entire gross earnings; that is to say, a tax of 2 per cent on all business actually done in this state, and also on the apportionment of all interstate business.

The present law imposes a gross earnings tax of 3 per cent on the Minnesota domestic earnings alone, and therefore it is obvious that the plan proposed by Senator Horton would greatly increase the taxes to be paid by the Pullman company and other similar companies.


