LETTER TO NORTHERN PACIFIC

Department Anxious to Learn the Names and Addresses of Crew of a Certain Offending N. P. Engine.

WANTED—The names and addresses of the fireman and engineer who operated a Northern Pacific engine known as No. 325 D on the afternoon of Oct. 9 in the union depot yards, in the vicinity of the Third street bridge; parties concerned will hear something to their advantage if they furnish the desired information to the St. Paul Health Department.

The above is not a classified want advertisement, but in substance the contents of a letter which Dr. Ohage addressed to the officials of the Northern Pacific railway yesterday. The names and names are wanted as the basis of a couple of warrants that will be issued if the parties can be located.

"This is the second letter I have sent to this railroad company," said Dr. Ohage yesterday, and so far I have received no answer. If the silence continues, I will see that the men are taken from the engine, no matter the consequences. The first was a warning, but this means business."

The letter which was posted yesterday afternoon, followed the completion of a

Kodak picture showing the engine in question filling the air with dense clouds of smoke, while on the back were notations as to the hour and date and number of the engine. A copy was enclosed with the missive, which, among other things, contained the following cheerful information:

For the past three days inspectors, armed with cameras, have haunted the vicinity of the union depot and the several railroad bridges, and the result is a number of completed pictures that are now being had at evidence in case warnings are not heeded.

Chinese Will Try to Make It as the Triumph of a Conqueror. VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 26.—Chinese papers received today by the steamer Olym-pia say that everything is being done to make the return of the court to Peking as much like a triumphal re-entry as possible so as to lead the people to believe that instead of being defeated, the Chinese troops won a victory. The military in all districts have been ordered to make a correct report of the strength of the army, the number of men and amount of ammunition in their respective districts. The circular is very particular to state that the reports must be correct, as upon the correctness of the same the success of a "great enterprise" depends. What this enterprise is the papers are guessing. In some of the districts a deficiency has been found in the army stores and an investigation is to be held.

COURT'S RETURN TO PEKIN.

A band of Thais attacked the German church at H. Ming, in Southern China, and destroyed it. The missionaries evacuated and reached Canton after much suffering. The rebels afterwards attacked the village and killed a hundred of the villagers. Gen. Wu sent forces to suppress the rebellion and killed 200 and captured 150, who were beheaded.

FRENCH NAVAL PROGRAMME

BREST, France, Oct. 26.—Presiding at the lunch today on the armored cruiser Leon Dore, the minister of marine, M. de Lanerhan, said she was one of a new contingent of upwards of 100 warships, each of which possesses perfect

fighting qualities. Unless unforeseen difficulties occurred abroad, the naval programme would be completed in the time fixed by the chamber and then France would enjoy at sea the same security that her numerous solid battalions assured her on the continent of Europe. While the French vessels were more costly, they were worth more than the ships of other maritime nations. The French navy was directing its efforts to the highest quality of its ships, rather than to numbers. Only strong nations could hope to honorably preserve peace and liberty.

REUNION OF GRANT FAMILY.

Windsor, Conn., Oct. 26.—Two hundred members of the Grant family assembled here today to honor the tercentenary of Matthew Grant, the president of the American branch of the family. The celebration will last three days and the programme includes addresses by prominent members of the family from all over the country. Rev. Roland D. Grant, D. D., of Vancouver, B. C., presides over the exercises. Reports of the executive officers showed that 1,463 new members have been enrolled during the year, making a total of 9,400, of which 2,500 are living.

Officers were chosen as follows: President, Congressman Theodore E. Burton, of Cleveland, Ohio; vice presidents, Ralph M. Grant, East Windsor, Conn.; Eugene J. Grant, Brooklyn; Hezekiah K. Grant, Philadelphia, Pa.; Capt. Robert T. Grant, Washington, D. C.; secretary and treasurer, Frank Grant, Westfield, Mass.; recorder, Rev. Arthur H. Grant, Montpelier, N. J.

The afternoon programme included an address by Congressman Burton, a poem by Miss Emma E. G. Thomas, of Philadelphia, and an address by John C. Grant, of Chicago.

ON THE AFGHAN FRONTIER.

Czar's War Minister Visits the Russian Outposts. NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—The Simla correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says that Gen. Kourpethin, the Russian minister of war, recently made a tour of the Afghan frontier, visiting the outposts, before proceeding to Russian Turkestan to witness the beginning of the work of the Tashkent-Orenburg railway.

The Russians some months ago began the extension of the new railroad toward Herat. At the same time they began the construction of a branch line toward Maruchak (Northern Afghanistan), which is evidently intended for strategic purposes.
