KING OF THE TURF DOES WONDERFUL WORK AT 'HAHA'

MADE THE MILE IN 2:05 1/2

Considering Unfavorable Weather Conditions, His Performance Is Equal to Any He Ever Made—5,000 People See Him.

Creseus the Great! Minnesota duffers her hat and proclaims this king. Before a multitude of 5,000 admirers, and on a track the equal to any in the world, but under weather conditions the most unfavorable, the prince of harness horses set a new mark for the aspiring equine trotters in the state.

The people who went to Minnehaha race track yesterday afternoon were accorded a treat that it may not be their pleasure to again enjoy. A cold, windy, clattering day, nobody expected to see any wonderful performance, and for this reason they were accorded a treat, and an unexpected one.

The people who were brave enough to take their chances of freezing to death all came away with a great deal more than the result, and that they were treated to the greatest exhibition mile that they will ever be privileged to witness.

After a third attempt Driver Ketcham nodded to the starter that he was ready to go for his trial against Creseus.

The three-quarter mile was reached in 1:32 1/2, and then he came down the stretch strong and resolute, never wavering.

The best previous trotting record made in the state was by Nancy Hart in 1899 on the Hamline track, and was 2:07.

The best previous trotting record on Minnehaha track was made by Fantasy in August, 1895, and was 2:09, and the best previous pacing record of this same track was made during the same time by Hal Potter, driven by the great jockey, "the silent Ed Geers," and the time was 2:04 1/2.

There were four starters, and all of them in good condition. Dell S had the pole, and they all got away to a good start on the third attempt.
