The Fusionists Are Confident of Electing Circuit Judges.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Nov. 4.—The fusionists of South Dakota expect to elect at least two of the eight circuit judges to be elected in South Dakota on Tuesday of this week, and may capture an other.

They believe they will re-elect Judge Julian Bennett in the third circuit, which embraces the counties in the extreme northeastern portion of the state; and Judge Joseph B. Moore in the eighth (or Deadwood) circuit. Judge Bennett has made a favorable impression during the four years he has been in office. He has expedited business, and because of this has become known as the business judge. He is very popular in his home county (Codington), as well as in every county in the circuit.

The Republicans do not concede the reelection of Judge Moore in the eighth circuit, but it is the belief in well informed fusion circles that he will prove a winner. He has an adverse majority of 1,000 against him in the circuit, but it is believed by his friends that he will overcome this and be re-elected by a safe majority.

ARRESTED FOR BIGAMY.

Arthur Bartsch Said to Have Two Many Wives.

WINONA, Minn., Nov. 4.—Arthur Bartsch, formerly of Philadelphia, was up in the municipal court this morning to answer to the charge of bigamy. It seems that Bartsch came to this city about sixteen months ago and went to keeping house with a woman whom everyone believed to be his wife. This illusion was dispelled when a woman arrived in the city who claimed she was the only rightful Mrs. Bartsch. She went at once to the office of the county attorney. The sheriff was sent to the home of Bartsch, and the woman he has been living with declared she was his wife. A complaint was then issued charging bigamy, but before the case came up in court this morning the second woman said she had never been legally married to Bartsch. There was consequently little on which to base the charge of bigamy, and a continuance was taken. Mr. Bartsch has been employed as a bookkeeper since coming to Winona. It is understood that he has offered to pay his wife \$400 and allow her a divorce, but that she wants \$2,000. Bartsch is said to have wealthy connections in Philadelphia, but it is not believed they will come to his aid.

ALL ENGLAND UPSET THEY BACK DELCASSE

FLATTERING VOTE OF CONFIDENCE FOR FRENCH GOVERNMENT.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—In the chamber of deputies today, Judge Radic, Socialist, interpellated the government on the Franco-Turkish dispute, criticising the action taken by the government, and contending that France ought to have intervened at the time of the Armenian massacres.

The foreign minister, M. Delcasse, replied that France's patience was exhausted by the port's breaking its own promises. France, in the present difficulty pursued no fresh advantage, but everybody would agree that this effort on the part of France ought to be at least put an end to the annoyances and injustices with which France contends in the Orient.

M. Delcasse said also that the appearance of French cruisers off the Turkish coast had several times proved that France had not forgotten the protection she owed to Christians, and the latter understood this. The French government had put forth every effort to restore order, and the government would never forget its duties towards humanity. But it must first of all remember its duties towards France.

AGAINST KOCH'S THEORY.

Brooklyn Doctor Inoculates a Cow With Tuberculous Germs.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Positive signs of tuberculosis have appeared in the cow which was inoculated with germs by Dr. W. B. Barney, of Brooklyn, several days ago. Dr. Barney will permit the disease to become more pronounced and will then kill the cow and hold an autopsy. Dr. Barney is certain that he now has disproved Dr. Koch's theory that human tuberculosis and bovine tuberculosis are not interchangeable.

The cow was inoculated by Dr. Barney about ten days ago. On Saturday last it began to show a fever, and now more of the known signs of tuberculosis are apparent in the beast. Dr. Barney said last night that he had no doubt that the autopsy to be performed would prove beyond doubt the fallacy of Dr. Koch's theory.
