## MANY KNOTS UNTIED

### JUDGE LEWIS DISSOLVED SEVERAL LIFE PARTNERSHIP BONDS YESTERDAY

### DESERTION THE CHARGE IN ALL

### Alleged Confidence Men Arraigned and Plead Not Guilty—Judge Jagard Makes Order in Forcier Case.

Judge Lewis yesterday disposed of a number of divorce cases. Annie Burton was given a decree of divorce from Frederick E. Burton on the ground of desertion. The defendant did not put in an appearance and after the plaintiff had sent out and got additional testimony to that first offered, Judge Lewis ordered the decree.

The court also has under consideration the plea of Emily Edson vs. Newell E. Edson, stating desertion as the reason why the bonds of matrimony should be dissolved. The couple were married in Oregon and there are two children, a girl of ten and a boy of seven. The plaintiff wants the custody of the children.

Nelle H. Thompson only lived with her husband, Marcellus, about seven months when he became untrue and deserted her, departing for parts unknown. The couple were married by a justice of the peace in 1897, without the consent of the girl's parents. There are no children and the plaintiff desires to resume her maiden name of Ellsworth.

In the cases of Andrew against Maria Jackson, Clara M. against Charles S. Denison and Sadie against Joseph Haeck, Judge Lewis ordered decrees for the plaintiffs.

### PLEAD NOT GUILTY.

Two of the alleged confidence men arrested by Chief O'Connor were arraigned in the criminal court yesterday. Cartney, the third of the trio, was ill and confined to his cell. ## MUST USE STAMPS

### PROBATE COURT HAS BEEN UNWITTINGLY VIOLATING INTERNAL REVENUE LAW

### ORDERS FROM WASHINGTON

Hereafter All Bonds Furnished by Executors, Assignees, Guardians and Receivers Will Yield Uncle Sam Revenue.

The judge and clerks of the probate court of Ramsey county, as well as those of many other counties, have been unwittingly violating the provisions of the internal revenue laws in regard to revenue stamps on bonds furnished by executors, assignees, guardians and receivers appointed by the court.

Under the internal revenue law of June 13, 1898, a portion of section 18 read to mean that the above named officers were exempt from any tax in connection with the bonds furnished. Accordingly, the clerks and judges of the probate court have allowed these bonds to be filed without affixing a stamp and now the revenue department is after the delinquents in this line and will make an examination of all bonds of this class and require that a 50-cent stamp be affixed to them.

Chief Deputy Collector Varr yesterday received a circular from the revenue commissioner at Washington instructing him to look up the bonds and see that they were properly stamped. The amendment of March 2, 1901, omits to mention this class of bonds as exempt, and therefore they will have to be taxed.

When seen by The Globe yesterday Judge Jagard stated that he had been filling the bonds right along without stamping them, as he had been instructed from headquarters that they were exempt. He was relieved by the amendment of March 2, 1901, and had only a ruling in connection with the law of June, 1898, to be guided by. There have, of course, been a large number of bonds of executors, assignees, receivers and guardians appointed since the law went into effect and it will be something of a task to go over them all and stamp them, but it will probably be done.

Under the amended law the only bonds that are exempt from the taxation are the bonds furnished by government, state, county or municipal officials, and bonds furnished by persons on another's bond to insure the original bond with the surety company.

He was an aged German and died at Rochester last Saturday. ### CONROY'S ACCOUNTS REFERRED TO ATTORNEY GENERAL.

The attorney general's office is awaiting the result of the examination of former Clerk Thomas Conroy's books before making any move in the matter. The shortages, mostly lines for violation of the dairy and food laws, and never turned over, amount to about \$388. ### South St. Paul Council Appropriates \$10,000.

South St. Paul will have a fine new water system, the council having voted \$10,000 for that purpose. It is the intention to place a pumping station on Concord street and pump a daily water supply to a standpipe to be erected on the hill above the city.
