Charles B. Bowly, who assumes the presidency of the Boston Clothing Company, has had a thorough schooling in the clothing business under exceptionally good auspices. He laid the foundation for his business career by starting in the cutting room of Oak Hall, the oldest clothing house in the United States, and worked in the various departments of its immense business until he had thoroughly mastered their details. When he graduated, as it were, to go with Willoughby, Hill & Co., of Chicago, another famous clothing house, he had the reputation of being one of the best judges of clothing in the country. He made his advent in St. Paul as the purchaser of the original

Boston store, the well known clothing house in the Northwest. He took hold of its management with a vim which resulted in a notable expansion of its trade, and at once identified himself with the business interests of the city. He has ever since been active in movements to promote the growth of St. Paul, as director of the Commercial club and the Chamber of Commerce. The evening mail train (No. 56) leaving Minneapolis 4:25 p. m., St. Paul 6:35 p. m., will not carry passengers.
