

Chicago's Practical Philanthropy

Municipal Lodging House Established for Benefit of Penniless and Suffering.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—A long stride toward the solution of the tramp problem was made by philanthropists and reformers of this city last week in the opening of the Municipal Lodging House at 12 and 14 Jefferson street.

The plan of a free lodging house conducted as an adjunct to the city government has been tried successfully in New York for several years. It was taken up in this city by the City Homes association, an organization in which a number of Chicagoans of prominent standing are interested.

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Last night 300 shivering, poorly clad and still more poorly fed unfortunates huddled about the great heaters or gathered in groups along the immaculate walls.

At a signal the men filed into the dining room, where each was given a tin plate of coffee and a large thick slice of fresh bread, weighing about five ounces.

In exceptional cases, such as cripples and very old, the lodgers were allowed to enter in advance of the common horde, and make themselves comfortable on a bench at the side of the room until the hour for serving the meal.

Across the rear of the office is a long desk having a wire screen with two openings. Back of this desk is a passageway through which the men from the dining room were next made to file, two at a time.

Each of these men had a record book with the following headings: Name, age, nativity, length of time in United States, length of time in city, occupation, last employer, reference, disposition, remarks.
