

Grand Christmas Anthems to be sung in City Churches Today.

In many of St. Paul's churches the anniversary of the birth of Christ will this morning be observed with music appropriate to the occasion. 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How to Get Plump.

To cure emaciation or undue leanness you must have absolute freedom from care and anxiety, at least ten hours sleep out of every twenty-four, in addition to this take maps during the day if possible. This sleep must always be broken into a rest for the appearance and general health as sleep induced by anodynes or narcotics in any form. The diet should be liberal and should consist largely of food containing starch and sugar; potatoes, fresh sweet butter, milk, cream, fruits, grapes and served with sugar, all vegetables containing starch and sugar, such as corn, sweet potatoes, beans, peas, foods of the macaroni and spaghetti kinds, fish and oysters, ice

How to Make the Wassail Bowl.

Stimmer a small quantity of these spices in half a pint of water—cinnamon, cloves, nutmegs, mace, ginger, cinnamon, and coriander; then put the spice to four or six bottles of sherry or madeira with one and one-half pounds of powdered sugar to every four bottles of wine. Set over the fire in a clean saucepan; meanwhile have the whites of six well whisked up in it. When the whole is a little warm take out a cupful, and so on for three or four times, until the mixture is thick. Add the whole of the remainder, pouring it in gradually and stirring briskly. The time for spices for each bottle of wine: ten grains of mace, forty-six grains of cloves, thirty-seven grains of nutmegs, eight grains of ginger, twenty-eight grains of cinnamon and forty-nine grains of coriander seed.

Yule Dough.

This was made into cakes of spiced dough; each cake being six or seven inches long and roughly fashioned to represent the human figure, with raisins for eyes, nose and mouth.

The Wassail Bowl.

This was a prominent feature in medieval English festivities. New Year and Twelfth Night. The bowl was often of massive silver. We still retain a semblance of this custom in the modern punch bowl.
