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HOW-ABOUT SEARLE?

BELIEF IS GENERAL THAT HE WILL ENTER CONGRESSIONAL FIGHT

WESTERMAN IS UP AND DOING

Several Reasons Why Searle is Believed to Have Best Chance to Win Out in the Sixth.

ST. CLOUD, Dec. 29.—While Judge D. B. Searle has declared that he is not, or will not, become a candidate for the Republican nomination for congress in the Sixth district, there are very few who have taken him at his word. In a recent interview at Wadena the judge is quoted as saying that he was not a candidate, not only for the nomination, it is a known fact that Searle county already has a candidate in the open in the person of Col. William Westerman, thus disposing of a part of the interview, at least. The closest friends of the judge in the county and district place about the same amount of credence in the other assertion. They are strongly of the opinion that at the proper time Mr. Searle will shy his castor into the arena and become an active candidate. That he is the strongest man yet spoken of for the Republican nomination is certain. Senator Buckman, of Little Falls, and Col. Westerman, of St. Cloud, will have many willing workers throughout the district, and it is predicted that he will be in the lead from the start.

There are a number of reasons for such an assertion. The prominent politician of Little Falls gives some very good reasons why Searle county will not cast its own vote against Judge Searle. In the first place, the party is backed by the bulk of the party in Morrison. In the second there is a judicial candidate in Little Falls whose friends would rally to his support of Judge Searle. In the third, the result of the judicial running, if for no other reason, the man who aspires to judicial honors is C. A. Lindberg, one of the most prominent of the Little Falls attorneys, who has been on the bench for upwards of a dozen years, and during that time he has made many friends. Moreover, he is a diplomat, and a politician as well, and the many kind words spoken to him in the years gone by will bear fruit when it comes to a congressional nomination—under primary election rules.

Westerman is well known throughout the district, and already has considerable of an organization at work in his behalf. As between he and Senator Buckman, the contest would be a close one, with the odds in favor of the Little Falls man, owing to his more skillful manipulation of things political. The younger element of the party can be safely counted for Westerman in the event that there should be but two candidates.

Another interesting story is being talked quite anent the judgeship, should Searle be elected. It is confidently expected, and that is the friends of M. D. Taylor, register of the land office, will insist on his becoming a candidate for district judge. Mr. Taylor is a well known lawyer, of ability, and has the requirements read for the position. While there is no more in it financially than in a land office position, the honor is one to which any attorney will aspire.

The candidates will have all entered the race early in the new year, and the prediction is freely made that among the aspirants to congress will be Judge Searle. With this certainty, his friends claim to be able to see far beyond the primaries.

IMPRISONMENT FOR DEBT.
