

West St. Paul Is a Hive of Industry.

The West Side of St. Paul is of comparatively modern growth, and has a character all its own. It is the great manufacturing district, the building term whose bourgeoisie will be a great commercial future. Acre after acre is covered with factories, and manufacturing industries, and tall chimneys and lofty smoke stacks, mounting high above long buildings many of which appear low because of their great length and breadth.


have been running night and day to fill orders, and the sales last year reached the sum of \$70,000. The principal articles manufactured are, as the name indicates, hoisting and derrick machinery of all kinds for contractors and quarrymen, hoisting engines, locomotive cranes, etc., and the foundry for steel castings is said to be turning out work of a very fine order. The buildings cover a large area, and the offices are among the finest on the West side. Some of the largest locomotive cranes ever constructed are the product of this factory.

This company primarily was fire engines, fire apparatus and fire department supplies generally, but now manufactures a number of other things, such as stationary steam engines, boilers, gasoline engines and pumps for all purposes, saw-mill specialties, steam shovels, etc. The plant is situated just south of the Robert street bridge, and is a long building, some 200 feet long by 75 wide. A large number of skilled hands is employed, and the machinery is of the latest and newest pattern. The Waterous company has been in business ever since 1886, and in 1886 was incorporated under its present name. C. H. Waterous is president; F. L. Waterous, vice president, and F. G. Waterous, general manager.

The Bohemian brand of the Yoerg Brewing company is famous all over this section of the country, and since 1872 this company has been a West side industry. Over 40,000 barrels of beer a year, including besides the brand above mentioned Royal Export, a bottled beer, are made here.

The business was first started on the East side, on Washington street, by Anthony Yoerg Sr. in 1848, and to him belongs the honor of being the first brewer in Minnesota. In 1886 Anthony Yoerg died, and the company is now incorporated under the name of the Yoerg Brewing company, Louis Yoerg being secretary and treasurer, and John A. Seegar president.

The cellars in the bluffs has a floor space of two-thirds of a mile, and the brewery itself is a picturesque stone building, four stories high. It is just under the brow of the bluffs, and is unusually pretty situated.



YOERG BREWING COMPANY'S PLANT.


break the skyline in the typical fashion of the factory district. As a manufacturing center the West side offers a most advantageous site, owing to its railway facilities which are unusually good.

One of the oldest and most important industries on the West side, which has grown up with the prosperity and increase there, is the Villume Box and Lumber company. Lumbering being one of the industries peculiar to the Northwest, and the Villume company, a home concern, the West side has good reason to regard it with satisfaction and pride.

Here it has grown and developed to its present status in the twenty years since its establishment in 1882. It started in a small way not far from the present

\$250,000. The heads of the corporation are, Eugene Villume, president and manager, A. H. Villume, vice president, F. E. Villume, treasurer, and A. G. Moosbrugger, secretary. While most of its business is transacted with St. Paul and the adjacent country, it is gradually extending it to other Northwestern towns and cities.

The American Hoist and Derrick company is another manufacturing business belonging wholly to St. Paul. Its offices and factories lie just south of the Robert street bridge. When it first began business in 1882, it was located for over three years on Eighth and Robert streets. In 1886 it moved to its present location and now employs three hundred men. It was incorporated in 1885. The principal officers today are Oliver Crosby, presi-

industries, and has grown from small beginnings to a large and prosperous business. Besides making pickles, catsup, sauerkraut, vinegar, mince meat, mustard, horseradish, German dill pickles, it is an importer of olives put up in various ways.

The company was organized in 1880, but established itself here at Wabasha and Water streets in 1880, and is today the largest manufacturer of pickles and other condiments between Chicago and the coast. The sauerkraut business alone is a large one, and requires over 600 tons of cabbage annually to fill its orders. In the vinegar factory a hundred barrels of vinegar a day are made.

In 1888 the company incorporated. M. A. Gedney is president, and takes an active interest in the business. He was its founder, and his three sons are associated with him. C. B. Gedney is the secretary and manager; T. V. Gedney, vice president, and H. E. Gedney, treasurer.

The Waterous Engine company is one of the most notable of the West side industries, and its growth has been both steady and rapid. The specialty of


HOW HIS BAGPIPE TOOK WHISKY.


