CITY MAY TAKE HOLD

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT PROPOSES TO DO ALL SANITATION WORK.

DR. OHAGE'S PLAIN TALK Says Unscrupulous Practices Are Not Unknown Under Present System—Asks for Larger Appropriation.

The St. Paul sanitation trust is in danger of being wiped out of existence. If the charter commission is agreeable to the extent of permitting all city departments to retain the revenue they accumulate, the trust will be absorbed by the health department. Men and wagons will be added, and the work now done by outside firms will be performed by the city and a reasonable profit for the city.

He says attendants injected ink into his nostrils and soapsuds into his eyes and subjected him to other indignities.
