FRAMERS OF TAX CODE QUOTED AGAINST THEIR OWN BILL

CIRCULAR FOR LEGISLATURE

Immediate Passage a Serious Mistake and Postponement of Action is Urged.

When the legislature convened yesterday the members found upon their desks the pamphlet entitled "Immediate Action on the New Tax Law Issue" which has been circulated by Twin City jobbing interests.

No marked reform in the taxation of personal property can be effected until the legislature has afforded greater freedom of action in the matter of legislation upon the subject.

Whatever the commission's views as to the true policy of the state upon several features of taxation, it will yield to the mandates of the constitution.

The circular then says: "The proposed law is confessedly not a 'just and equitable' system of taxation, and it is important to insist upon this in the public school text-books."

It is not the wisest course to pass a law which is so manifestly unjust and inequitable, and which is so manifestly unconstitutional.

The law which they have drafted for submission to the legislature is presently unconstitutional in providing that the amendments shall take effect upon the vote of a majority of the members of the legislature.

It is wise for the legislature to rush into a hasty action upon a subject so important as taxation for this state.
