READY FOR SUMMER

WHITE BEAR YACHT CLUB HOLDS ENTHUSIASTIC ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

OSCAR TAYLOR IS COMMODORE

Several New Boats Are to Be Built and Prospects for Coming Season Are Unusually Bright.

The White Bear Yacht club held its annual business meeting at the Aberdeen last night, about forty members being present. The report of the treasurer showed the club to be in a prosperous condition, with assets amounting to more than \$15,000, with no indebtedness. The election of officers for the ensuing year was the most important business that came before the meeting. The outlook for the season of 1902 was very promising.

The captain's report showed that twenty-six racing yachts participated in the 1901 season, and that the total number of racing knots sailed during the summer was 1,784, which was the high water mark of the boats entered for racing, fourteen were new, there being one addition to Class A boats, seven to Class B and six to Class C.

The one-design C class boats, built from a design which Mr. Duggan, of Montreal, presented, were reported on as a decided improvement over the lark class which they superseded, and some very interesting races resulted. The interest in the B class was great last summer, and this class furnished the largest number of average entries. The five one-design boats of this class which were built by Mr. Ordway, added great interest, and resulted in much informal racing on other than regular days. The A class was, as usual, keen and close during the entire summer, while the open class furnished close racing and a good number of entries. The club boats which went to other waters made a good showing, the Nokomis having won the Green Lake regatta in the Inland Lake regatta at Green Lake, and the Minnetonka having shown up well among the leaders in a class. The Minnetonka also won what was known as the Green Lake cup, sailed for at Oshkosh last summer, but was ruled out in the deciding races on a claim of foul, a decision which was undoubtedly correct, and has been the subject of much controversy, with the probable result of the cup being sent to White Bear.

The club has added largely to its number of sailors during the last season, and the number of well trained men is now far in excess of what it has ever been. A triangular course has been suggested for next season, which can be accomplished by placing a buoy in Mahtomedi bay. The old triangular course was abandoned last year on account of weeds on the Clark street leg.

Oscar L. Taylor Is Commodore.

The election of officers resulted as follows: Oscar L. Taylor, commodore; Homer E. Clark, vice commodore; W. Clarkson, captain; H. A. Merrill, secretary; W. B. Geary, treasurer. Commodore Taylor made a very fitting speech before his election, and concluded by saying that he had had the office of commander in mind for some time as very suitable to his taste. The regatta committee was elected as follows: Dr. A. McLaren, H. Van Vleet, H. P. Clark, W. Clarkson, Dr. Taylor.

The executive committee was composed of Milton Griggs, L. P. Ordway, George Rodenberg and J. Taylor. The regatta committee of last year finished its work and awarded the annual championships to Minnetonka, in Class A; Jim Creak, in Class B; Bianca, in Class C. Several new boats are being constructed for next season, and it is expected that the selection of a candidate to race the defender of the Seawanhauk cup, held by the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club of Montreal. The challenge of the Bridgeport club was accepted by the Royal St. Lawrence club last fall. The White Bear challenge for the cup a year ago, but failed to lift it. But even the cup cannot officially contest for it this year, as the members are anxious to try their hand at furnishing the challenge, which should they be successful, would be under the colors of the Bridgeport club.

WANT AMERICAN TALENT

REPRESENTATIVES OF NATIONAL CLUB OF LONDON IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, March 8.—W. A. Garvin and G. C. Lea, of the National Sporting club, of London, arrived today on the St. Paul.

"We have come," said Mr. Garvin, "to try and induce American champions of boxing, fencing and wrestling to go over to England during coronation week and meet there the best men that Great Britain and the other countries of Europe can produce. What we chiefly want are the champions of the army and navy, but they must be men that are at present in the country's service and not, like Tom Sharkey, who, although formerly in the United States navy, has been a professional for many years. We will also try to get Harvard and Yale to send their best boxers to England to compete against those of Oxford and Cambridge. Lord Lansdale, the president of our club, has offered a cup as a prize for the winner of a boxing contest between Harvard and Oxford, and the Earl of Kingston another cup for the winner of a contest between the boxers of Yale and Cambridge.

The chief feature of the tournament will be a ring of war between twelve picked men of Europe and twelve from the United States. Amateurs will receive trophies and the professional cash prizes, but the professional line will be very fine between the two. The belt which is valued at \$5,000, which will be given, besides a large amount of money, will be given to the best that his country can produce, and the winner will receive an additional \$5,000. The contest will be held in Covent Garden, London. If we can arrange for some of our men to be held in the open air we will do so."

AGAINST SUNDAY BALL.

Women of Ohio Temperance Union Decline Against Sabbath Games.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 8.—The executive committee of the Ohio Women's Christian Temperance union, which closed its midwinter session here today, ordered that a crusade against Sunday baseball be immediately inaugurated by the state organization and by every affiliated society in Ohio. The organization will direct its attention to defeating a bill to legalize the playing of baseball on Sunday which is now pending in the state assembly. When this is accomplished the local organization in the several cities in which the game is permitted to be played on that day will insist that the city officers enforce the law. There is now on the statute books a law prohibiting baseball on Sunday, but it has never been enforced.

BROKE UP PRIZE FIGHT.

Deputy Sheriffs Stop Chicago Pugs Attempting to Fight at Elgin.

ELGIN, Ill., March 8.—Chicago fighters and their backers attempted to pull off a series of bouts in a barn near Elgin Friday night, but were stopped by the deputy sheriff as the first of the contestants entered the ring. No prize money was made, but the milling was broken up and the select audience which had assembled was compelled to go home without so much as seeing a blow struck. This is the second attempt which has been made to pull off fights at Gilberts.
