M'CARTHY THE LATEST

Isaac Senator Announces His Candidacy—A Dozen Other Ambitious Ones Eager to Represent the Eighth District.

Judge Morris' withdrawal from the Eighth district congressional fight has opened the way for many aspirants. Senator C. C. McCarthy, of Grand Rapids, has announced his candidacy and has an active campaign at once.

Some of the Republican workers are said to be opposed to McCarthy because of the independence he has always manifested in the senate. Two days before the close of the session this winter he delivered a speech on the tax bill which was a scathing arraignment of the Republican attitude on the tax report.

The Democrats have declared it to be one of the most effective Democratic campaign documents at hand, and will use it in the coming campaign.


Dispute Over Primary Election.
