TENNESSEE POLICE HAD WRONG CLUE

He has been identified by a detective as such. Williams refuses to talk about himself. He was arrested for carrying concealed weapons and has been serving sentence in workhouse of the county in which he was arrested.

STRIKE IS DECLARED OFF IN BELGIUM

WYOMING RANCHMEN MUST REMOVE FENCES

Federal Officers Order 100 to Take Down the Barriers or Suffer Penalty of Going to Prison.

CASPER, Wyo., April 20.—Special agents of the Interior department were here during the past week investigating the reports of illegal fencing of government lands. The result has been that 100 ranchmen have received notices to remove fences within sixty days under penalty of \$1,000 fine or imprisonment.

STOCKTON IS DEAD

Noted Author Succumbs to Paralysis After Hemorrhage of the Brain

BURIAL IN NATIVE CITY

Body Will Be Taken From the National Capital to Philadelphia, Where Novelist Was Born, for Interment.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Frank R. Stockton, the well known novelist, died suddenly here this morning. The cause of Mr. Stockton's death was paralysis immediately resulting from a hemorrhage in the brain. He was a guest at the banquet held Wednesday night of the National Academy of Sciences, when he was suddenly and mysteriously taken ill.

WEST SWELTERING IN A HOT APRIL

Hottest Weather of Season in Fifteen Years Makes Omaha Suffer, and Missouri Nearly as Warm.

OMAHA, Neb., April 20.—Today was the hottest April day in fifteen years. The thermometer at 5 p. m. reached 56 degrees, the highest previous record being 51.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 20.—The temperature here at noon today was 52 degrees, a change of more than 40 degrees in six hours. A high wind set in and soon the air was dark with particles of dust and sand. Several buildings of light structure were blown down.

KANSAS CITY, April 20.—The highest temperature today was 91 degrees. A furious hot wind, such as might be looked for in August blew.

TOPEKA, Kan., April 20.—A dry, hot wind from the south has swept over Kansas since early this morning, doing much damage to vegetation of all kinds. Those interested say the wind has done incalculable harm to the wheat.

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FUNSTON CAUSTIC IN ATTACK ON SENATE

General Denounces Some of Its Members for Criticizing the Philippine Campaign.

Special to The Globe. DENVER, April 20.—Gen. Funston, at a banquet of the Sons of the Revolution, criticized the United States senate in the following language: "The influences here in the United States have done much to keep the insurrection going. I have nothing but sympathy for the senior senator from Massachusetts, who is a victim of his own overheated conscience. I have a feeling of the utmost contempt for the statesmen who three years ago were loudest in their demands that this country grab not only the Philippines but every possession that Spain had, and are now leveling criticism against the administration and the conduct of the war. They are playing the game of peanut politics and gambling in the blood of their countrymen."

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KILL GARRISON BY DYNAMITE

Managua Barracks Destroyed and Two Hundred Troops Meet Death

BLAME ON CONSPIRATORS

Nicaragua National Palace and a Number of Houses Damaged or Wrecked by Explosion.

ZELAYA IS INVESTIGATING

Citizens Flee From the Capital in Terror Upon Advice of the Police After the Terrible Explosion.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 20.—A severe explosion occurred here the night of April 16. A large two-story barracks, situated near the lake front and in the center of the city, was blown to fragments.

Two hundred officers and soldiers are reported to have been killed and many soldiers and other persons are reported to have been injured. A large number of houses near the barracks, including the National hotel, the Central telegraph station and the National palace were damaged or wrecked.

President Zelaya was absent at Masaya at the time of the explosion, but he hurriedly returned to Managua on horseback. He has published a statement in which he attributes the disaster to the work of conspirators. He says that tons of dynamite and a large quantity of powder were stored in the barracks.

After the first explosion the police notified the terrified people to temporarily leave the city. It was thought the burning buildings still contained dynamite. Large numbers consequently fled to the suburbs.

The first explosion was followed by several minor detonations, supposed to have been caused by the explosion of packages of gunpowder.

The people who fled the city at the time of the explosion are returning today (Sunday). The fragments of the numerous, who were not blown to atoms, are being buried.

COLLISION AT WATAB HOLDS COAST TRAIN

Passenger Crashed Into by Freight and Locomotives Badly Damaged, but Only One Passenger Hurt.

Special to The Globe. ST. CLOUD, Minn., April 21.—The Northern Pacific coast train, west bound, collided near Watab shortly after noon today with an east bound extra freight.

The freight was coming down a heavy grade at high speed, but the crews of both locomotives had time to jump, none of them being seriously injured. None of the passengers was injured with exception of one woman, who was seriously cut about the head. The locomotives were badly wrecked, as were many freight cars. One car containing horses was broken open and the animals took to the prairie.

A wrecking train from St. Paul reached here at 6 o'clock, and it is expected the wreck will be cleared by morning.

BELIEF IN PEACE GROWS IN AFRICA

London Papers' Correspondents Declare That Tentative Agreement Has Already Been Reached.

LONDON, April 20.—The Pretoria correspondent of the Standard cables that there is good reason to believe a tentative agreement has been arrived at which will prove mutually cordial and lead to an early cessation of hostilities. The Utrecht correspondent of the Daily Mail says it is recognized that the Boer delegates at Pretoria have full powers to negotiate without reference to the Boer leaders in Europe, who have no real influence on the peace negotiations.
