

TROUT SEASON OPEN Fishing Begins In Brisk Fashion at Southern Wisconsin Points

SPARTA REGIONS CENTER An Old Fisherman Gives Valuable Tips as to Best Methods of Landing the Water Beauties With Rod and Line.

Special to The Globe. SPARTA, Wis., April 20.—The open season for trout fishing began last Tuesday and the first week was a busy one for the fishermen. Expectations of "plumping off" place from which the best fishing in the state is reached and the day before the season opened the city was full of visitors from the surrounding cities, even as far as Chicago and Milwaukee, impatiently waiting for the opening morning.

These are the shiest and hardest to capture of all game fish and a thorough knowledge of their habits and weather conditions is necessary to pursue this sport successfully.

White Should Be Avoided. A few pointers might prove interesting and instructive to novices as well as experienced fishermen. To begin with catching white or of a light color should be worn, as this is the most likely to catch the fish's eye.

There should be a breeze, preferably from south to west. The object of the breeze is to "churn" the surface enough to make it difficult for the fish to see plainly objects on and above the surface and to distinguish between artificial and real bait or flies.

At this time of year such worms, pieces of meat and fish and live minnows are generally used but as the season advances, artificial flies are used by those who go for the sport there is in fly rod medium-sized trout.
