

BE WISE TODAY! SUES WIFE FOR HOME

'TIS MADNESS TO DEFER! Joseph Plotz Would Compel Wife to Provide Him a Domicile

Paine's Celery Compound SHE SELLS THEIR FARM

Property Brought \$6,000 and His Spouse of Thirty Years Refuses to Divide and Deserts.

Special to the Globe. ST. CLOUD, April 22.—Joseph Plotz, who has passed the seventieth milestone of his life, will ask the courts to force his wife to give him a home or to divide the proceeds of the farm which was recently sold for \$6,000.

Thirty years ago Mr. Plotz was married. His wife had sufficient money to purchase 100 acres of wild land in the neighborhood of Albany and on this they located and established their home. Mr. Plotz was a worker, and soon the farm was under cultivation, was supplied with numerous buildings and all the improvements that usually go with well-kept farms.

It was several months ago that his wife suggested that they sell the farm, thus taking advantage of the increased valuations that were being placed on farms in all sections of the state. The husband demurred to such action and wanted to retain the farm, where they had spent so many years of apparently happy married life.

The sale was made and the wife received the money. She at once went to the home of her daughter, who lives near Sauk Center. When her husband had arranged matters satisfactorily at the farm which he was vacating, he followed his wife to the home of her daughter. He was promptly informed there that he was not wanted and that he would have to hunt a home for himself, that his wife had decided to make her home in the future with Mrs. McKusick.

There was no suggestion of a division of the \$6,000 and when the old gentleman suggested that it was time to divide the money as well as affections, the wife demurred. There has been no division and Mr. Plotz has decided to appeal to the courts to make a settlement.

SPRING IS TOO WARM

Weather Bureau Sees Need of Moisture in Several States

CORN PLANTING IS SLOW

Seeding Retarded by Freezing in North Dakota and Dust Storms Cause Some Trouble in Minnesota.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The weather bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions is as follows: The week ending April 21 was warmer than the average in the Pacific coast and Rocky mountain regions, in the Missouri valley and the northern districts to the eastward; it was too cool in the Middle Atlantic Southern states and decidedly dry over the greater part of the Central valley and Middle Atlantic states.

The latter part of the week is marked by unusually high temperature in Kansas and Nebraska, indicating late drought conditions in these states. The general weather conditions although not conducive to rapid advance of vegetation were very favorable for farming operations in nearly all parts of the country.

The progress of corn planting has been rather slow, except in Missouri and the northern states, where the best crops about finished in the Central and West Gulf districts. A large acreage of ground is prepared for planting in the states of the central valley and some planting has been done in Southern Illinois, but elsewhere northward of the Ohio. The early planting is coming up in Southern Kansas where cultivation has begun.

Winter Wheat Is Slow. Winter wheat has continued to make slow growth and on the whole is in less promising condition in the principal winter wheat states of the central valley.

At the close of the previous week Missouri's winter wheat temperature was generally needed for this crop throughout these districts and also in the Middle Atlantic states. The outlook in California continues bright and a crop as experienced improvement on the North Pacific coast.

The germination of early sown spring wheat in the southern portion of the spring wheat region has been slow and seeding has been retarded by freezing in North Dakota. The Red River valley in Minnesota are drying nicely and seeding began on the whole.

Good progress has been made in cotton planting, except in some portions of Tennessee, the Carolinas and Florida, and in the southern portion of the cotton belt. Over most of Texas cotton is up to satisfactory stands and plowing and churning are well under way.

In Maryland and Tennessee tobacco plants are doing well, but in Virginia, the Carolinas and Kentucky they are small and in places irregular. Some transplanting has been done in South Carolina. The general outlook for fruit crops, peaches, in portions of the Ohio and Central Mississippi valleys continues promising in the districts east of the Rocky mountains.

Grass is backward generally throughout the central valleys and is in need of warmth and moisture.

STEAMBOAT FIRE DEATH LIST GROWS. It is Believed That Seventy Persons Perished in the Burning of the River Boat Pittsburg.

CAIRO, Ill., April 22.—The insurance men, wrecking crew and others have been investigating the ruins of the burned steamer Pittsburg today, but owing to the heated condition of the hull, nothing special has been developed and very little has been done towards recovering bodies from the river.

At the end of the third day, those on board the steamer report that eleven are known to be saved, fifty-one are known to be lost, and over twenty are missing. It is believed that the death list will go on and will reach a hundred.
