### LIST NOW COMPLETE

The City Ballot Is in Final Shape and Ready for the Printer

### SMALL ERRORS FOUND

Cannot Be Corrected Without Order of District Court—Dr. Whitecomb's Name May Read "Whiteob" on Ticket.

The list of candidates who will be voted for at the regular spring election, Tuesday week, is now complete, and by tomorrow will be in the hands of the printers, who will begin the turning out of the 20,000 or more ballots required.

The ticket, as it will read when it reaches the voters' hands, was completed by City Clerk Jensen and his clerical force late yesterday afternoon, though not until every name had been carefully examined and compared with the nominating returns as received from County Auditor Johnson.

This comparison brought out a number of trifling errors in the spelling of names, which, while really of no value, will necessitate an appeal to the district court judges, who under the election law are the final tribunal for correction. In the returns from the nominating board Assemblyman Whitecomb's name is spelled Whiteob. This is a trifling error, yet to ward off complications the spelling on the regular ballot will have to be the same unless permission to correct is received.

The prohibition city committee came forward with twelve more names, each accompanied by the proper petition, and this will be found on the official ballot when it is printed. These consist of Comptroller, B. T. Butler; city treasurer, H. S. Webster; alderman, Tenth ward, S. K. Robinson; assembly, J. J. Kirkman; W. R. Hawthorne, B. J. K. Murray, H. W. Holder, T. S. Ellison, C. F. Wells, W. A. Powers, S. A. Johnson.

Two weeks ago, when the prohibitionists filed their list of candidates, they accompanied it with a tender of \$50. Yesterday they had to put up an additional \$50, the legal department holding that the first payment is tied up in the suit now pending in the supreme court.

On the advice of the corporation attorney, Clark Jensen refused to consider the name of Frank D. Freeman, who is the Socialist candidate for mayor. There is already a Socialist-Labor candidate on the ticket, Andrew W. M. Anderson, and the election law forbids two titles of the same name. The only difference is that Freeman uses the title Socialist only, but this is held to be in conflict with the law.

### BIG DROP IN BUTTER

Tumbled to 21 Cents Yesterday, Which Is Almost as Low as Last Year.

### 12-CENT DROP IN A WEEK

Came Back to Earth as Suddenly as It Shot Up—Rain and Creamery Prospects Responsible.

Creamery butter sold in St. Paul yesterday for 21 cents, a drop of 3 cents in twenty-four hours, and a drop of 12 cents in one week. Its sudden and unexpected sailing last week was paralleled by its meteoric descent during the past week, and yesterday it struck the bottom with a thud and likely to remain at about that figure, with slight fluctuations for some time to come.

One year ago extra creamery butter was quoted at 12 1/2 and 20 cents wholesale, so that the present price is, under the circumstances, exceptionally moderate and cannot be complained of. This is probably the legitimate spring price, and the present price is a few days and further declines come slowly, but it is too late to expect any recovery. The general rains of Friday throughout the West undoubtedly had considerable to do with the drop in the market. Butter was about due to drop anyway. Reports from all over the West indicated that there would be a very sudden and unexpected increase in the supply of fresh butter. Warm weather has become more general throughout the West, and the rain was the final cap to the situation. The rain meant the near approach of pastures suitable for grazing, and that meant a good supply of grass butter.

The record of the year in butter prices was made shortly before the final downward turn came. The shortness of supplies during the winter months, and the price up to 33 cents, the highest point of the season, and not exceeded at any previous time since the spring of 1893, when a record of 35 cents was established. Conditions were peculiar, and the advance had come in the face of a determination to keep clean floors and a strong effort to prevent prices from going so high.
